Letter from Hon. James M. Scovel. To the Editor of The Evening Telegraph. CAMDER, N. J., SATURDAY, May 1.—Thanks, my warmest thanks, for my friends who "called me out" last night, at the meeting for freedom in Caba. I yielded my right to be heard to another whose name eas on the programme. While for me, as Rachel said, there were "no big letters"—I was not on the bills—I went to hear, not to be heard, actuated by the

common impulse which lives and burns in the heart of every American man and woman—the noble sentiment of sympathy with every nationality struggling for His struggling for life.

Nature has done much but man nothing, for Cuba.

Just within the torrid zone, Cuba has a matchless climate, where the cool northeast wind makes a Paradise of the summer months. Snow never fell there save once, in 1856. From 1724 to 1796 this island was the nursery of the Spanish Armada. Spain's standing army was 20,000 soldiers; a handful against the patriotic soldiery who now hold, with a grasp like that in which Grant held the Rebellion, 20,000 out of 25,000 square miles of Cuban territory. The man of December, Napoleon, like a tiger, looks one way and leaps another. He extends the eagle of France as a shield for expiring royalty in Spain. struggling for life.

old for expiring royalty in Spain. He thought that the interest and nonor of France tanght him to carry the French standard up to the walls of Mexico. But American patriotism, strong and stubborn, was too much for the conspirators of France. And Napoleon the Third will yet learn that the only insanity incurable in Cuba, in Ireland, or in

America, is a love of liberty.

The spirit that clasped the Bible in handcuts and festooned the Cross of Christ with chains waxed powerful in 1834 in America and in Cuba, for in that year the King of Spain was asked for seven thousand negroes that they might be inured to labor before the Indians in Cuba ceased to exist. To the year 1842 350,000 slaves were imported in that single island—13,000 a year. But now the memory of Abraham Lincoln is stronger than the crowns of France and England and Spain. That grave at springfield overshadows the Tuileries. We need not give \$100,000,000 for this Queen of the Sea, as President Polk desired to do; not \$30,000,000, as Sil That grave at dell wished us to do in 1859. Young America—ay and the sober second thought of America every where—says "Cuba will come to us because she is where—says "Cuba will come to us because she is Free." Then let our hearts go out in this great cause. Reason pleads forever for the oppressed and the unwritten laws of humanity bid us lift up that Flag ever-victorious; a shelter and an inspiration to all of God's creatures, and I believe I express the sentiment deep in the heart of the head of the nation, and deep in the heart of his people, when I say the nation's war cry is "Down with the Spanish Flag and up with the Flag of the Free."
