Pants, May 4.—The Geographical Society have decreed a gold medal to Dr. Haves, of the United States, for his services in the work of Arctic exploration and discovery. To-day, the President of the Society, with a deputation of members, waited upon General Dix, the Ameri can Minister, and presented the medal, requesting him to transmit it to his distinguished countryman, and accompanied the presentation with an earnest aspiration for continued friendship between France and America. WILMINGTON.

Two Destructive Fires Yesterday. Two very heavy fires occurred in Wilmington last evening, the first breaking out about 6 o'clock in the evening, the latter shortly after

The first was at the shingle factory of McAlkin & Co., on the Christiana, supposed to be the work of an incendiary, as the watchman em-ployed in the works had left the premises but a few minutes when the fire broke out. The building and an unusually large stock of goods were totally consumed. The building belonged to J. L. Gregg, valued at \$3000. The stock and machinery belonged to McAlkin & Co., who had removed here about a year since from Norfolk, Vn. Their loss is about \$12,000.

Barrett's stables were also much damaged Loss about \$400. The building was insured in the Farmers Mutual for \$3000.

Mr. McAlkin, \$7500 in the Royal, of Liver-pool, and \$3000 in the Home, of New Haven. Before this fire was under control another alarm was given, calling the firemen to the foot of Market street. This began in a wheelwright shop, on the south side of the bridge. The shop was of frame, and being very dry, its destruc-tion was very rapid. The Grant House adjoining, and a lager beer saloon, were soon destroyed. and the fire communicated in a very short time to the large carriage factory of Robinson & Brother. It was a large building, full of com-bustible material. The value of the stock on hand was \$25,000, much of which was saved. The estimate of losses is as follows:
