General Edgar M. Gregory, the New Appointee-A Sketch of this Lafe and Public

Services.

A despatch from Washington announces that the President has appointed General Edgar M. Gregory to the position of U. S. Marshal for the Eastern District of this State, vice General John Ely, deceased. On the 1st of January, 1804, Edgar M. Gregory was born at Sand Lake, Rensselaer county, New York. At the age of eighteen, he removed to Deposit, Delaware county, in the same State, and engaged in the lumber business, a vocation he followed for many years. He was ever of a devout turn of mind, at the age of thirty being an elder in the Presbyterian Church. In 1840 he wound up his business at Deposit, relinquished his position as commander of a regiment of State militia, and moved to Chierinati, Ohio. There he pursued the calling of a banker, in addition to his older one of lumber merchant, still taking a deep interest in all matters pertaining to the Church, the Sunday School, and beneficent enterprises. He soon became the President of the Young Men's Bible Society of Cincinnati, which post he retained for sixteen years. He was one of the early foes of the institution of slavery. He termed it the curse of the land, and predicted that if it was permitted to live war would be its result. In 1850 he came to this city, and at the breaking out of the Rebellion took an active part in promoting enlistments, devoting most of his time and energies to aiding the came to this city, and at the breaking out of the Rebellion took an active part in promoting enlistments, devoting most of his time and energies to aiding the cause of freedom and Union. At first he identified himself with the Home Guard organization of this city, and became Captain of Company A, Junior Home Guards, of the Thirteenth ward. Shortly after the organization of this body, it was proposed to raise a regiment for field service out of our Home Guard. The idea at once became popular, Captain Gregory being among the first to respond. Its organization was started, Captain Gregory was chosen Colonel, and obtained authority direct from the Secretary of War to proceed at once in its formation. It was the 91st Pennsylvania Volunteers. On the 21st was the 91st Pennsylvania Volunteers. On the 21st of January, 1862, the regiment, numbering neari 1000 men, left the city for the seat of war. On reach ing Washington, however, it was there detained to set as provost guard of that city, relieving the 4th Regular United States Infantry. In a brief time Colonel Gregory was ordered to Alexandria, Va., to act as military governor, which position he filled with dignity, firmness, and success. During the time of his office there he never relinquished the command and management of his regiment and its affairs.
When relieved from duty as military governor, his conduct in the field was equally admirable, always ready in any emergency to lead his men, and share their dangers. His galiantry at the battle of Fredericksburg filled his men with so much confidence and esteem, that they presented him with a fine horse and a magnificent sword, as a token of their appreciation of his merits. His honorable and gallant deeds having been brought before the President by prominent army officers, the well-earned rank of brigadier-general was conferred on him as a reward. He has twice been wounded in battle.
