# NEWS SUMMARY.

## City Affairs.

-Early yesterday morning two ice-houses, situated on the west bank of the Schuylkill river, opposite Turtle Rock, were destroyed by fire. Being situated within the limits of the park, they had been purchased by the city, and were about being demolished and the lumber and stone removed by John Jones, who had con-tracted therefor. There was no ice stored in them, and the loss incurred is simply the value of the old lumber. It is supposed that the fire was the work of an incendiary.

At ten o'clock on Saturday morning the examination of female applicants for teaching vocal music in the public schools was held in the Normal School, Sergeant street. There were forty-five applicants present, and the examina-tion was conducted by Professor Jean Louis, assisted by Dr. Leipold Meignen, superintended by Mr. Steinmetz, President of the Board of School Directors, and Mr. Armstrong, chairman of the Music Committee, assisted by Mr. Fessen, of the Girls' Normal School. #### The Wonders of Minute Workmanship.

In the twenticth year of Queen Elizabeth a blacksmith named Mark Scaliot made a lock, consisting of eleven pieces of iron, steel, and brass, all of which, together with a key to it, weighed but one grain of gold. He also made a chain of gold, consisting of forty-three links and, having fastened this to the before-mer tioned lock and key, he put the chain about the neck of a flea, which drew them all with ease All these together, lock and key, chain and flea. weighed only one grain and a half. Oswaldu-Norhingerus, who was more famous even than Scaliot for his minute contrivances, is said to have made sixteen hundred dishes of turned ivory, all perfect and complete in every part, yet so small, thin, and slender that all of them were included at once in a cup turned out of a peppercorn of the common size. Johannes d, of Mitelbraun, carried this wonderful work with him to Rome, and showed it to Pope Pau V. who sat and counted them all by the help of a pair of spectacles. They were so little as to be almost invisible to the eye. Johannes Ferrarius. a Jesuit, had in his possession cannous of wood. with their carriages, wheels, and all other mili-tary furniture, all of which were also contained in a peppercorn of the ordinary size. An artist named Claudius Gallus made for Hippolytus d'Este, Cardinal of Ferrara, representations of undry birds sitting on the tops of trees, which, by hydraulic art and secret conveyance of water through the trunks and branches of the trees, were made to sing and clap their wings; but at the sudden appearance of an owl out of a bush of the same artifice, they immediately became all mute and silent .-- World of Wonder.

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

## Foreign Affnirs.

LONDON, May 8.-In answer to inquiries from the Associated Press of New York as to the condition of the London money market, the following may be stated as a correct view of financial affairs here:-The stock market has been in-fluenced unfavorably by the increase in the rate of interest of the Bank of England to 41/2 per cent., and the current belief that a further advance will be made shortly; also, by the political uncertainty occasioned by Senator Sumner's

In the Cortes yesterday General Prim alluded to the rumors that he meditated ral Prim alluded to the rumors that he meditated an attempt against the Liberal regime, and pro-nounced them utterly baseless. He declared that the future would prove that "honor and liberty" was his motive. It is reported that General Cabrera, a noted Carlist leader, has appeared in Catalonia.

MADRID, May 9.—The condition of the na-tional finances causes much anxiety. It is esti-mated that the expenditures will exceed the revenues by 12,000,000 reals.


