THE NEW YORK CLIPPER BUILDING .- The New York Clipper, the well-known theatrical and sporting journal, has just commenced a new era of existence by moving into a magnificent new building at the southeast corner of Centre and Leonard streets. The Chipper has been conducted with remarkable tact; it gives all the latest theatrical and sporting intelligence from all parts of the world, and its articles on the drama and kindred subjects are able and discriminating. The erection of a new building is a gratifying evidence of prosperity, and while internally it is arranged with every convenience for carrying on the various operations of a newspaper office, its exterior is handsome, and it is an ornament to the city.

The Clipper Building was designed architecturally by Mr. J. M. Morrell, No. 337 Fulton street, Brook-lyn, who selected the modern French style, four stories, with the Mansard roof. The front is of the stories, with the Mansard roof. The front is of the school of Jean Goujon, and is of remarkable beauty, being one of the purest specimens of correct archi-tecture in New York. Two large and handsome stores are on the first floor, each fifteen feet in height. The second floor is devoted to the business of publication. On one side of the hall is the counting and reportorial rooms, and on the other three editorial rooms, fitted up with all the modern improvements. Upon each floor above are five rooms, three spacious closets and water-closets, until the Mansard is reached, which is exclusively devoted to Mansard is reached, which is exclusively devoted to the composition room. Above is the dome, devoted to the janitor, whose apartments comprise three rooms, with closets. The entire building, fifty-seven by forty feet, and eighty feet in length, from the ground to the top of the handsome railing surrounding the roof, was constructed by Mr. Walter Jones, corner of Tenth avenue and Twenty-first streets. The front is of the Ohio stone called Beres, and the windows in the front of the building are of French glass, imported expressly for the purpose, each pane being sixteen feet square and two forming a window, except the stores, which have four each. The front of the building is graced with a handsome illuminated clock three feet in diameter, and another is placed upon the sidewalk in front of the door. To "cap the climax," a flagstaff of considerable height has been placed upon the roof, which bears a gilt weather vane, emblematic in its character, representing a miniature clipper ship seven feet in length, full rigged and with all sails set, made of zinc and covered with gold leaf. With the increased facilities afforded by these handsome and commodious quarters, the readers of The Clipper may expect to see even greater improvements in its management in the page. the future than have been made in the past,

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
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
