

NEWS SUMMARY.

City Affairs. A large meeting of journeymen carpenters was held last evening at the hall Broad and Arch streets, for the purpose of adopting a uniform price for their labor. William McGowan was elected chairman. A discussion took place in reference to the wages not received by journeymen carpenters. William Wallace contended that journeymen carpenters had a right to protect their interests by demanding such wages as would afford them a comfortable living, and raise them above the possibility of pauperism. He suggested that \$2.50 or \$3.00 should be fixed as the proper price for a day's labor. Other remarks were made, when a resolution was adopted fixing the wages at \$3.00 per day from this date. After some further business, of no public interest, the meeting adjourned until this evening.
