The fire is supposed to have been accidental.

A PROCLAMATION.—In pursuance of the provisions of the act of Congress, approved April 10, 1869, as the time for submitting the constitution passed by the Convention, which met in Richmond, Virginia, on Tucsday, third day of December, 1867, to the voters of the State, registered at the date of such submis-sion, viz. July 6, 1869, for ratification or rejection, and 1 submit to a separate vote the fourth clause of section first, afficie three, of said curstitution, which is in the following words: "Every person who has been a Senator or Repre-sentative in Congress, or elector of a president or vice president, or who had any office divider any State, who having previously taken an oath as a member of Congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any State legislature, or as an in

or as a member of any State legislature executive or judicial officer of any St State. have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the energy thereof. This clause shall include the following thereof. This clause shall include the following officers: Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secre-tary of State, Auditor of Public Accounts, Second Auditor, Register of the Land Office, State Trea-surer, Attorney General, Sheriff, Sergeant of a city or town, Commissioner of the revenue, County Surveyor, Constables, Overseers of the Poor, Com-missioner of the Board of Public Works, Judges of the Supremé Court, Judges of the Circuit Court, Judge of the Court of Hustings, Justices of the Courty Courts, Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Cour-County Courts, Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Cou cilmen of a city or town, Coroners, Escheators, In-spectors of tobacco and flour, and clerks of the Su-preme, District, Circuit and County Courts, and of the Court of Histings, and Attorneys for the Com-monwealth; provided that the Legislature may, by a vote of three-fifths of both houses, remove the disabilities incurred by this clause, from any per-son included therein, by a separate vote on each each CASE

which is in the words following: "In addition to the foregoing eath of office for Governor, Lieutenant Governor, members of the General Assembly, Secretary of State, Auditor of Public Accounts, State Treasurer, Attorney Gene-ral, and all persons elected to any convention to frame a constitution for the State, or to amend or make that constitution is more an or to amend or revise that constitution in any manner, and the mayor and council of any city or town shall, before they enter upon the duties of their respective of-fices, take and subscribe the following oath or af-firmation; provided, that the disabilities there in contained may be individually removed by a three-tifths vote of the General Assembly: "I ---- do solemnly swear, or affirm, that I have

never voluntarily borne arms against the United States, since I have been a citizen thereof; that I have voluntarily given no ald or countenance, counsel or encouragement to persons engaged in armed hostility thereto; that I have never sought or ac-cepted, nor attempted to exercise the functions of any office whatever, under any authority or pre-tended authority in hostility to the United States that I have not yielded a voluntary support to any pretended government, authority, power or consti-tution, within the United States, hostile or inimical thereto; and I do further swear or affirm, that to the best of my knowledge and ability I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic; and that I will bear true and faithful allegiance to the same; and that I take this obligation freely, without mental reservation or purpose of evasion, and that I will well and faithfully discharge the duties of the office on which I am about to enter, so help m God. The above oath shall also be taken by all the city and county officers before entering upon their duties, and by all other State officers not included in the above provision. In the above provision. Foreign Affairs.

LONDON, May 15 .- Reports, believed to be based on good authority, are in circulation that the French government will soon publish a peaceful manifesto, and simultaneously reduce its army.

LONDON, May 15 .- Mr. Johnson, the American Minister, took formal leave of the Queen by letter, and not at a personal interview, as was reported. He had, on Thursday, an interview with Lord Clarendon, and officially announced his retirement, at the same time presenting Mr. Moran as charge d'affaires.

LONDON, May 16, 11 P. M .- Telegraphic advices received to-night from Paris show that the political agitation there has revived to-day, that the excitement is very great, especially in those sections of the city where the Liberal is strongest. The authorities are taking extraordinary measures to prevent disorder, and at the last accounts no serious trouble had occurred.

The Pays newspaper announces that a grand popular demonstration is to be made on Monday.

PARTS, MRy 15 .- Political meetings in this city continue to be attended with disorder, and the police are frequently obliged to interfere. Several arrests have been made of parties prominent in making disturbances. The Prefect of Police has issued an order prohibiting gatherings in the streets in the vicinity of electoral meetings.

PARIS, May 16 .- Election meetings were held in all quarters of Paris yesterday to a late hour, but the excitement moderated as the day advanced. At night some crowds in the streets were dispersed by the police. They made no resistance, and no serious disturbance occurred. The government has issued a warning, which is placarded throughout the city, declaring that a renewal of the recent disorderly assemblages and demonstrations will not be tolerated. Minister Forcade de la Roquette has issued instructions to prefects, advising them to dissolve any meeting likely to lead to disturbances of order, and to strictly enforce the law prohibiting political meetings within five days of an election.

MADRID, May 15 .- The Cortes has rejected an amendment to the constitution in favor of making Spain a federal republic. The vote stood 182 against 64. A proprosition for a triennial directory, to be appointed by the Cortes, has been introduced and is now under consideration.

MADRID, May 16 .- The Cortes yesterday, after a long debate, rejected the proposition for a triennial directory, and it is now confidently believed that a regency will be created, with Serrano at its head. Several members of the civil guard have been arrested on charges at present unknown. Trouble has arisen with the volunteers for Cuba in consequence of the non-payment of their bounties.
