Mr. John Collins at the Arch. Mr. John Collins, the popular Irish comedian and vocalist, who has been making a tour of the world since he appeared here several years ago, received a cordial welcome back to Philadelphia last evening at the Arch Street Theatre, where he commenced an engagement with the lively comedy of The Irish Amassader and the rattling farce of How to Pay the Ren'. Mr. Collins is one of the very few representatives now on the stage of a line of Irish characters that we would be loth to lose. That burlesque on humanity, the Irish peasant of whom Barney Williams is the chief representative, has almost succeeded in driving the Irish gentlemen of Tyrone Power from the stage. John Brougham has nearly ceased playing this line of parts, and Mr. Collins, therefore, has scarcely a rival in the field. The Irish Ambassador is a very elegant and very amusing comedy, and Hos to Pay the Rent is a capital farce. The characters of "Sir Patrick O'Plenipo" and "Morgan Rattler" in these pieces afforded Mr. Collins excellent opportunities to win the regards of his audience, and his performance last evening was heartily applanded throughout.

Mr. Collins was admirably supported by the Arch Street Company, and we can promise those who visit the theatre during his engagement a series of performances that will be remembered with pleasure in the future.

"Florette" at the Theatre Comique. Last evening, Florette the Cricket was produced at the Theatre Comique, according to announcement, to a large audience. The good impression made by the rehearsal of the piece on Saturday afternoon was more than confirmed by the performance, which is decidedly in advance of anything that the Galton troupe has yet given in this city. The adaptation is exceedingly well done, and the music which has been chosen to illustrate the story is of a high grade, and yet well suited to catch the popular ear. The drama of Fanchon, with which all play-goers are familiar, is a perfect gem in its way, and with a competent performer in the part of the "Cricket," it cannot fail to secure the sympathies and applause of an audience. The character is admirably suited to Miss Susan Galton, and her acting and singing last evening received the heartiest recognition. Not having seen Maggie Mitchell, Miss Galton performs the part in her own way, without being trammelled by preconceived notions. She misses some of the peculiar elfishness that distinguishes Maggie Mitchell's acting, particularly in the shadow scene, but this is compensated for by the fine sentiment, the tenderness of feeling and warm-heartedness that underlie the rough exterior of the little witch girl, and simply as a dramatic performance her "Florette" will be entitled to take a high rank. Miss Galton appeared to be a little nervous last evening, which detracted slightly from the force of her acting and singing, but as she becomes familiar with the part this will disappear. and she will render the role with a vivacity and sparkle that will be sure to tell with her audience.
