Foreign Affairs.

LIVERPOOL, May 31,-Mr. Motley received the addresses of the Chambers of Commerce at his addresses of the Chambers of Commerce at his hotel this morning. In reply to that of the American Chamber of Commerce, he returned thanks for the welcome he had received as the representative of the United States. He said it was the earnest hope and the chief wish of President Grant's administration, and of the people of America, to cultivate faithfully friendly and equitable relations with the Government and equitable relations with the Government and people of Great Britain. The happiness of the world, the advancement of civilization, and the best hopes of humanity depended on the concord of all branches of the human family, especially on that of the two leading nations, both connected by public and personal interests, allied

by blood, addicted to commerce and the cultivaby blood, addicted to commerce and the chiliva-tion of the arts of peace.

Mr. Motley concluded as follows:—"My most strenuous efforts shall be devoted to further a good understanding, on the basis of enduring friendship and kindly relations, in accordance

with the great principles of justice and honor, which are the immutable and only safe, unerring guides in the conduct of nations,"

In answer to the address of the Liverpool Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Motley expressed a high appreciation of their friendly sentiments towards America, and assured them that during the period of his office he should endeavor to promote a good understanding between the two nations of the same race, bound by unity of in-terests hitherto unequalled. The best and highest purposes of both were fulfilled by the faithful friendship of the American people, and the Government desired amicable relations with Great Britain on the basis of institute and alla-Great Britain on the basis of justice and a dispassionate regard for the rights and duties of both. It was the carnest wish of America to extend her commerce, but the question of free trade was beyond the limits of his functions its settlement being vested by the people in

In the House of Commons to-night, Mr. Gladstone moved the third reading of the bill for the disestablishment of the Irish Church. A large number of petitions against the passage of the bill were then presented, after which James Maden Holt, member for Northeast Lancashire, made, and Lord Elcho, member for Haddingtonshire, seconded, a motion that the bill be re

A long but uninteresting debate followed, terminating in the refusal of the House to accept Holt's proposition, and the bill passed by a vote of 361 against 247. The result was received with WORMS, May 31.—The Protestant Congress which assembled here to-day, was attended by twenty thousand persons, including representa-tives from all the States of Germany. The congress, by a unanimous vote, resolved against Papal exhortations to return to the Roman Church and in condemnation of the encyclical letter and syllabus. The idea of the formation

of a United German Church is mooted.
VIENNA, May 31.—It is said that Ismael

WAR.

In the afternoon session of the New School Presbyterian Assembly, yesterday, Rev. Dr. Sun-derland, of Washington, delivered an address quite belligerent in its character. He wished, if the report (recommending that prayer be offered up throughout the whole Church for the preser vation of peace between Great Britain and the United States) should be adopted to see it go out with his protest against the acts of England to-wards America. He thought the whole report might seem impertinent; that this Assembly was needlessly interfering with what belongs to the Government: that it might seem to be prema-ture and untimely. He was of opinion that England needed a sound drubbing from somebody, though he was not fully prepared to say it became us as a nation to administer the chastise

After alluding to the conduct of Great Britain towards the Chinese and the Sepoys, he remarked that Ireland stands to-day the monument of English perfidy and oppression. England needs our friendship more than we do hers. He was in favor of peace, but he believed that war was sometimes a dire necessity.
