Charge of Perjury. NEW YORK, June 2 .- Subsequent to the conviction of McHenry for perjury in the United States Court, Mr. S. N. Pike made affidavit that Willett Fergusson, one of the witnesses for the defense, had committed wilful, corrupt perjury in testifying that he had seen Pike in Deputy Commissioner Harlan's office on the 9th of January, 1868. Fergusson was arrested and brought before Commissioner Betts and held in \$10,000 bail. The case will immediately be brought before the grand jury. McHenry had alleged that Pike bribed Harlan, and Fergusson swore to Pike's interview with Harlan.
