The Kellogg Concert at the Academy of Music. Despite the heat and the lateness of the season, a large, fashionable, and enthusiastic audience was present at the Academy of Music last evening, on the occasion of a grand concert in which Miss Clara Louise Kellogg was expected to be the leading at traction. As this charming and popular voc dist is about to leave the country again for an indefinite sojourn abroad, her friends were determined to give her a fitting farewell, and on her final appearance this evening, in one of her most admirable operation roles, that of "Rosina," in Il Barbiere di Seviglia, the house probably will, as it certainly should, be filled to overflowing.

The concert last evening was essentially a success. The principal feature in the programme consisted in three selections from Rossini's posthumous work, the wonderful Miss Kellogg sang the Crucifixus, a rare gem, with her accustomed skill and effect. Signor Reina, a new face to Philadelphians, who was classified on the programme as a baritone, but whose quality of voice belongs rather to the degree of basso, executed the Quoniam aria, from the same work, in a manner which produced a very favorable impression. Signor Boetti, heretofore achieved an enviable place on our stage, gave the final morecau from the Messe Solennelle, the Domine Deus This was the first opportunity afforded our musical public of listening to any portion of what has been declared elsewhere to be the masterpiece of all Ros sini's oratorios. But from these disjointed fragments it was impossible to form a true conception of the merits of the work as a whole. Miss Kellogg also sang a very attractive air in French from Ambroise Thomas' new opera of Hamlet, the first instalment given in this city. The melody was a most delicate and delicious one, and was admirably adapted to the voice and style of the artist. The famous trio, "Zitti zitti," from Il Barbiere, sung by Miss Kellogg and Signors Boetti and Reina, and a duo from Verdi's new opera of Don Carlos, by the two latter were also given, interspersed by Mr. Rudolf Hennig's admirable performances on the violoncello and Miss Alide Topp's charming piano execution. This vivacious little lady by the delicacy and brilliancy of her performances last evening gained a fresh hold upon the hearts of Philadelphians, and disappeared from the stage only to re turn in response to encores, the eagerness of which would have thrown Brignoli into a towering passion and filled the heart of Sims Reeves with dismay.
