City Affairs.—Last evening, there was a large attendance at the Academy of Music, on the occasion of a meeting to consider the proposed acknowledgment of Almighty God and the Christian religion in the Constitution.

—The Board of Health has directed Health Officer Mr. John E. Adickes to employ five horses and carts at not more than \$4 a day each, and seven men at not more than \$1.50 a day each, to thoroughly clean the streets.

Foreign Affairs.—Belfast, June 10.—Thirteen members of an Orange lodge in this city have been arrested for disturbing the peace.

Paris, June 10.—The Prefect of Police has pledged throughout the city a proclamation urging all good citizens to aid the authorities in the execution of the law and the preservation of public order and peace.
