

LITERATURE. REVIEW OF NEW BOOKS.

THE STOMACH AND ITS DIFFICULTIES, by Sir James Espey, M. D. Published by J. B. Lippincott & Co.

This work was originally published about seventeen years ago in England, and it has passed through several editions since then. The author gives the result of his own professional experiences as to the causes of dyspepsia and other stomachic disorders, and the diseases which are likely to result from the neglect or disorganization of the internal functions of the human system.
