The Irish Republican Convention—Yesterday Moraing's Session—Object of the Assembling. CHICAGO, July 6.—The Irish National Republican Convention met in Farwell Hall, in this city, yesterday morning. The hall was appropriately decerated with flags and mottoes. The convention was called to order by Mr. Bell, of the Irish Republican, who proposed as temporary chairman of the convention the Hon. J. W. Fitzgerald, of Cincinnati. He was deciared elected. Mr. Fitzgerald addressed the delegates at considerable length, taking ground in favor of universal liberty to all classes and colors; also in favor of the protection of American industry.

The Solar Eclipse. Despatch to the Associated Press. Washington, July 6.—The second party fitted out from the Naval Observatory to observe the solar eclipse of August 7 left this city with their instru-ments on Monday evening for the vicinity of Des-moines, Iowa. Professors William Harkness and J. R. Eastman, U. S. N., have charge of the meteoroogical and astronomical work, and the party has been joined by Dr. Edward Curtis, U. S. A., under orders from the Surgeon-General's Department, to photograph, in connection with the Observatory party, the various phases of the eclipse.

AT THE SEASIDE.

The "Fourth" at Cape May—A Grand Rush for the Island—Nothing Like It Before—How the Multitude Passed the Anniversary of Inde-From Our Own Correspondent.

CAPE ISLAND, N. J., July 5. Last year the West Jersey Railroad Companies placed their afternoon fast express train between Camden and the seashore on the time-tables about the 15th of July, and that date marked the opening of the season at Cape Island. This year, however, the railroad companies determined upon taking time by the forelook, and, accordingly, they announced that the full summer complement of trains would commence to run on the 3d. The result of these facilities for reaching this delightful spot, combined with the curious freaks of the weather during the past week or two, and the coincidence of the Anniversary of Independence with the weekly day of rest, were very manifest.

There was a great scrambling for seats in the cars on Saturday, and when the train finally started on its way, a few minutes after time, in consequence of the difficulty in getting enough cars together, it contained over five hundre 1 passengers. For three or four days previously, large numbers had arrived, and when the eve of the Fourth of July closed in upon us there were by some hundreds more people on Cape Island than ever before in its history at the corresponding period of the year. This fact was so marked and singular that it elicited universal comment and testimony, especially from the affable gentlemen who presides over the destinies of the great hotels, none of whom had ever carried about with them more benignant and-shall I not say so?benevolent countenances. The upshot of the whole matter is, that "the season" so called has been inaugurated fully two weeks earlier than usual, and under auspices which give promise of more than the customary activity. By the erection of the monstrous and magnificent pile known as the Stockton House, additions and improvements to several of the old establishments, and the almost magical springing up of about fifty new and elegant cottages, the facilities of the place for stowing away sweltering humanity have been extended altogether sufficiently for the accommodation of about two thousand people. Last summer, when the heat in the city was at the highest, and Cape Island was, in consequence, most crowded, elbow room, both at the table and in bed, was sadly lacking. The great increase in the accommodations to which I have referred, and which I will note more in detail hereafter, will happily suffice to relieve the discomfort which rendered a solourn at Cape Island last summer a veritable pursuit of pleasure under difficul-

Sunday, as revealed to those who had escaped the glare and noise of the city, was a quiet, sober, orderly day, without anything to mark it as being the anniversary of the most momentous event in the history of the nation. Strolls upon the beach, tussies with the breakers, hearty and well-considered dinners, groupings in the shade for purposes of gossip, halfwaking siestas, half-heard sermons, and all the infinitude of phases which mark the quiet Sabbath by the sea-side, made up the day-a day less burdensome than are most of the days which fall to the lot of men. To-day has been more hilarious. The Sabbath restraint is no longer upon us, and to a man-and a woman as well-we embrace the freedom of the occasion to make ourselves as merry as we may. Yesterday only the wayfarers ventured to take a bath. The staid people who are here for the summer can afford to let the ocean alone on Sunday, while the hasty sojourners of a day cannot, or think they cannot, and consequently do not. But to-day everybody has made the plunge, some with a shiver and a shrinking fear, as if the monsters of the deep were standing with yawning jaws, ready and eager to engulf them; others with a bound as free and reckless as that of the frolicksome porpoises which

disport themselves just without the motley string of bathers. Spasmodic efforts to observe the day with some regard to its traditions have also been indulged in, Every now and then the ear is saluted by the unwelcome and discordant report of the fire-cracker. The children rush pell-mell to the scene, and contribute their shrill voices to its sputtering notes, and raise a great hubbub, and flatter themselves that they are nothing if not as patriotic as were their fathers when they were children before them. And then, about high noon, a steamer flying "Hudson" from her stern, and "Philadelphia" from her bow, and fairly loaded down with pleasure seekers, sweeps around the Cape, and swings up and down along the line of bathers, making the day hideous with the

screechings of her whistie, and drowning the votce of the breakers in the booming of her guist. So the day passes and night approaches, and with it comes another characteristic feature of an orthodox Fourth of July. In the spacious dining-room of Congress Hall the people will assemble at 8 o'clock in the evening, to winess a genuine spreading of himself by the great American eagle, after the fashion in vogu for almost a century. Several speeches will be delivered, among the orators who have promised to be in attendance for the purpose of honoring and enlightening the occasion being that erratic bird of the mountains, the Hon. James M. Scovel, of Camden. With his fertile fancy and exhaustless fountain of standard popular quotations, all who choose to attend will be fairly entertained. WASHTENAW
