Foreign Affairs,

London, July 15-Midnight. -In the House of Commons the Irish Church bill, as amended in the House of Lords, came up for consideration. There was a full attendance of members, and the galleries were crowded. Mr. Gladstone, on rising, was greeted with loud cheers by the Liberals and derisive shouts from the Tory benches.

He said, with respect to the amendments which had been made to the bill, that the Government proposed to restore the preamble and the date of disestablishment as they appeared in the original bill, and they should agree to the amendments relating to curates' annuities and to the protection of annuitants, with some modifications; but all the other amendments they should oppose, with the single exception of the grant of £500,000 in lieu of private benefactions made before 1660.

Disraeli said that, although the abstract principles of the bill had been repeatedly discussed, there had been little discussion on the details of its provisions. He hoped the amendments made would receive calm con-

Mr. Gladstone then moved the House disagree to the preamble as amanded. He thought the concurrent endowment which the Lords had in view was a very different scheme from that of Mr. Pitt, which contemplated an established Catholic Church side by side with the Established Church, and under State control. Concurrent endowment, as now understood, was totally opposed to the spirit of the time.

If the House could be induced to agree to it, it was certain that the country, especially large constituencies, would not sanction it He strongly advocated the appropriation of the surplus fund, as originally proposed, with a proviso reserving to Parliament control over them.

Disraeli thought the House ought to agree to amend the preamble. He asserted that the House of Lords did not desire the reservation of the surplus for concurrent endow ment, and ridiculed the plan for its appropriation. He hoped the House would prevent such a waste of the public funds, and not allow them to be dealt with in this loose and vague manner.

Mr. Ball, member for Dublin University, thought the restoration of the original preamble would be fatal to many advantages secured to the Church by the Lords.

Mr. Bright admitted that at a former time he had proposed something like the present scheme of concurrent endowment, but declared that public feeling was now totally opposed to religious endowments, and no Minis ter would be able to carry such a scheme. He felt that all the plans, save the one originally proposed by the bill, were so full of difficulties that it would be idle to discuss them.

Sir Roundell Palmer, although not a supporter of concurrent endowment, considered, under the circumstances, that grants for residences to the clergy of the great majority, could not be refused out of that fund, which contrary to his ideas, they had declared was wrongfully taken from the great majority, and used for the religious purposes of the minority. Unless some proposal of this kind was agreed to, they would never establish religious equality or satisfy the expectations of the Irish. They should not allow their anti-Catholic prejudices to refuse this small boon to the great majority.

The House then divided, and the amendment of the House of Lords with respect to endowments was disagreed to by a vote of 346 against 222; majority for the Government, 124.

The amendment in regard to the appropriation of surplus funds was also disagreed to, by a vote of 246 against 164.

Mr. Gladstone then moved the restoration of the original date, namely, January 1, 1871, for the dissolution of the Legislative union between the Churches of England and Ireland, and, after some discussion, the date was restored without a division, and the

House then adjourned. LONDON, July 15 .- The Times says the pro-

gress of Spain towards an enlightened commercial policy will soon become a necessity, and with a more liberal tariff system, it will be difficult for her home produce to compete with American, and she will be unable any longer to monopolize the markets of the Antilles. Under these circumstances Cuba will become useless to Spain, and pride alone can lead her to hold on to a dominion disputed in the teeth of the best Spanish troops. Prim and other statesmen are convinced that the separation of Cuba is only a question of time, but national honor prevents Spain from taking such steps as long as the insurrection prevails, but when the island is pacified the natural dietates of reason ought to be lis-

Cuba is valuable. Spain wants eash, and a purchaser is at hand. Should the island be canvassed, a "plebiscitum" would result in favor of annexation to the United States. The only serious question is, can the United States at this moment afford the purchase money. It is for the advantage of both hemispheres that each should follow its own course untrammelled by interference of the other. Spain, like Russia and Denmark, may well consent to sell the remainder of her transatlantic possessions. It is fortunate she has anything left to sell.

London, July 15 .- In the international rifle match on Wimbledon Common, the riflemen of Scotland were victorious, beating those of England and Ireland.

QUEENSTOWN, July 15. - The steamship Russia arrived here at 8:14 P. M., having left New York on July 9, at 9-24 P. M., thus making the shortest passage on record. Signed - "Passengers on the steamship

Paris, July 15 .- The French journals comment unfavorably on the prorogation of the Corps Legislatif, before the verification of the election was completed. The Government is accused of closing the Chamber with the design of stifling discussion. The session will probably be resumed on August 20. It is rumored that Prince Napoleon will be made President of the Council; Baroche, President of the Senate; and Miral a Senator, while Rouher will become a candidate for a vacant sent in the Corps.

Madnin, July 15 .- In the Cortes, yesterday. Prim introduced the new Minister, and remarked that the present Cabinet was constituted from the majority, and though the men had been changed, the policy of the Government was unchanged. The Republican Deputies replied, making severe attacks on the Government policy.

VIENNA, July 15 .- Severe tumults have occurred this week among workmen at Brunn. The military were called out and fired upon the mob, killing two and wounding twelve. The crowds have dispersed, but great excitement still prevails, and the authorities are taking every precaution to prevent threatened revivals of the disorders.

Benne, July 15,-Switzerland has ratified the treaty of commerce with the Zollverein Convention, for the protection of literary property with the North German Confede racy, and a naturalization treaty with Wur-

temberg. HAVANA, July 15.—General Echevera, President of the Havana Railroad, has been arrested, and will sail for Spain to-morrow. Notaries have received orders to record the sales of confiscated property in certain districts, as a precautionary measure to prevent its destruction by the rebels. The volunteers, last night, serenaded Generals Ferrer, Canto, and Lesca. Three recent eugagements are reported, in which the rebels were defeated. There is a scarcity of provisions at Puerto Principe, and the authorities are distributing food to the inhabitants.

The Work of Parish Priests in England.

The London People's Magazine is publishing a series of papers entitled "Our Parish Priests; their Work and their Play, their Helpers and their Hinderers;" from one of which we copy the following epitome:

"To live among the people, whether in the crowded courts of towns, or in the solitude of entirely country villages; to pass from house to house-av, from mansion to hovel-a medium of communication, a vehicle of information, between rich and middle classes and poor; to make themselves sharers in the cares and troubles, in the interests and joys of their flock; to explain away little misunderstandings; to heal little sorenesses; to smooth little irritations; to atone little feuds; to be a safety-valve for little discontents (all these being lurking and undeveloped dangers); to relieve want that would never have been known, or have been known by some outbreak of crime, but for their searching out; to go about preaching peace and obedience, temperance, virtue, and godliness; instilling principles of order; refining and raising the thoughts of the people by their conversation and influence, even by the mere fact of their expected visits; aiding in the improving of their houses, in the promotion of health and cleanliness; to superintend and share in the education of the next generation in intelligence, in moral, yea, in religious principles-this is their work. And now suppose that such a moral-police system as this were a scheme devised by some admirable statesman, and not really, though quietly, at work, what Government would not hail such a plan as good almost beyond even any reasonable hope?"

COMMON COUNCIL OF PHILADELPHIA CLERK'S OFFICE, PHILADELPHIA, June 25, 1869. In accordance with a Resolution adopted by the Common Council of the City of Philadelphia, or Thursday, the twenty-fourth day of June, 1869, the annexed bill, entitled
"An Ordinance to Authorize a Loan for the Payment of Ground Rents and Mortgages," is hereby

biished for public information.

A N ORDINANCE
To Authorize a Loan for the Paymen
Ground Rents and Mortgages.
Section 1. The Select and Common Conneils of the
City of Philadelphia do ordain, That the Mayor of
Philadelphia be and he is hereby authorized to borrow, at not less than par, on the credit of the city,
from time to time, seven hundred thousand dollars
for the payment of ground rents and mortgages held
against the city, for which interest not to exceed the
rate of six per cent, per annum shall be paid, half rate of six per cent. per annum shall be paid, half yearly, on the first days of January and July, at the office of the City Treasurer. The principal of said loan shall be payable and paid at the expiration of thirty years from the date of the same, and not before, without the consent of the holders thereof; and fore, without the consent of the honders thereof, and the certificates therefor, in the usual form of the cer-tificates of city loan, shall be issued in such amounts as the lenders may require, but not for any fractional part of one hundred dollars, or, if required, in amounts of five hundred or one thousand dollars; and it shall be expressed in said certificates that the loan therein mentioned and the interest thereof are

payable free from all taxes.

Section 2. Whenever any loan shall be made by virtue thereof: there shall be, by force of this ordinance, annually appropriated out of the income of the corporate estates, and from the sum raised by taxation, a sum sufficient to pay the interest on said certificates, and the further sum of three-tenths of one per centum on the par value of such certificates so issued shall be appropriated quarterly out of said income and taxes to a sinking fund, which fund and its accumulations are hereby especially pledged for the redemption and payment of said certificates.
