Philadelphia, July, 1869.—To his Excellency U. S. Grant, President of the United States—Honored Sir:—The Declaration of Independence having been signed in the city of Philadelphia July 4, 1718, this city has undertaken to celebrate on July 4, 1876, the Centennial Anniversary within its limits, on a scale of magnificence and splendor bentting such a great event.

As a feature of this celebration, it is proposed by the understaned (a primary committee) to erect a building in Fairmount Park, for a musical festival of one week's duration, the said building to afford an commodation for one hundred thousand persons, while the performers shall number twelve thousand The audience, as well as the stage, is expected to comprise the greatest of the great who will be im-pelled by the grandeur of the occasion to grace it

with their presence.

All that science and ingosuity, or and nature, patriotism and international coursesy can devise, will be contributed and co-operate in this the Nation's Jubilee.

For such cause we would ask an expression of

your kind approval and for its success the best wishes of your patriot heart.

#### Foreign Affairs.

London, July 17.—The debate on the amended Irish Church bill was continued until a late hour this morning. After the rejection of the amendments proposed by the peers, Disraeli took the floor and spoke at some length, regretting the repudiation of the amendments adopted in the House of Lords. The Church was not the question at issue in the late elections. He thought the agreement of the Lords to read the bill a second time an act of magnanimity, considering the great majority opposed to the measure; and this agreement was only given on the understanding that the House of Commons would consider the amendments adopted in a conciliatory spirit. He could not understand how the course the Government had taken could be reconciled to the expectations held out to the House of Lords.

Mr. Gladstone replied to these remarks, saying that the promise given to the Lords was that the amendments which could be approved would be respectfully considered, and he maintained that that pledge had not been violated. He had conceded much in deference to the Lords, and they had fulfilled and more than fulfilled all pledges given. (Cheers.) He was certain that if any harm had been done to the Church, it was by those who described the grievous and enervating effect that disestablishment would have on the zeal and life of the religious community.

If the Church was destitute of vigor, the sooner they quit it the better. He would make a solemn protest against these disheartening and degrading convictions, and expressed an humble and confident expectation that in the future the members of the Church would regard the day of the passage of this act as the day of their religious regenera-

Mr. Gathorne Hardy took the floor, and accepted the appeal made to posterity in regard to the beneficial effects of the bill.

He supported Mr. Disraeli's statements. John Bright had used threats of a dissolution of Parliament in order to keep the party together, and coerce the House of Lords. He considered the Lords as a co-ordinate authority, and thought they had been treated

in an unworthy manner. Mr. Bright denied that he had ever used threats of a dissolution. His only reference to the subject was what might be the expression of a popular feeling if the subject of concurrent endowment was referred to the nation. He regretted the unfounded charge which had been brought forward against him, but which a great majority of the House disbelieved.

After further debate, a committee was appointed to draw up a report embodying the reasons for the disagreement to the amendments proposed by the Lords,

The bill for the government purchase of the telegraph lines of the kingdom was read second time, and the House adjourned. It is said the House of Lords will give up their amendment to the Irish Church bill in regard to concurrent endowment and the Uister grant, and will adhere to the amondment refusing to devote the surplus pro-ceeds of church property to the relief of unavoidable calamity and suffering, as proposed

London, July 18 .- Additional advices from Rio Janeiro represent that the allied army in Paraguay, after their recent victory, advanced to Villa Rica, and at the last accounts commanded all the approaches to that place. Lopez had declared the consulates of France and Italy deserted.

Paris, July 18.—The Journal Official of to-day publishes a decree of the Emperor, containing the following appointments to the Ministry:-Minister of the Interior, De Forcade; Minister of Justice, Duvergier; of Foreign Affairs, Auvergne; of Finance, Magne; of Commerce, Alfred Leroux; of Public Works, Gresnier; of Marine, Gerouilly; of War, Marshal Niel; of Public Instruction, Baurbeau; President of the Council of State, Chasseloup.

Paris, July 17.—M. Lesseps officially an-nounces that the opening of the Suez Canal wili take place on Nov. 17.

HAVRE, July 17.—The international ocean regatta, from Cherbourg two hundred miles to sea and back, took place yesterday and today. The yachts entered were the Guineore. Aline, Cambria, Julia, Diane, Mistere, Ondelle, and Sylvia. All started at 11 o'clock on Thursday, the Cambria returning to the starting point first, closely followed by the Julia. The Cambria won the race by three seconds. Time, 46 hours. The race was remarkably fine. There was no time allowance, all the yachts entering on an equal footing.

VIENNA, July 17 .- The Emperor gave an audience to-day to the delegations of the Imperial and the Hungarian Reichsrath. In reply to the President of the Hungarian delegation, he said he had been called to exercise equal influence over the common affairs of the empire and kingdom. Guided by wise moderation and good feeling, he had created these delegations, and they would be aided with all the influence of his monarchy in their labors for the consolidation of peace and public confidence. The Emperor then addressed Prince Auersperg, President of the delegation of the Imperial Reichsrath, and assured him that sincere co-operation with the Hungarian delegation was the surest guarantee for the maintenance of internal and external peace.

Madrid, July 17.-Two commissioned offis and three sergeants of the garrison of Valladolid, and several volunteers of that city, have been arrested, charged with being engaged in a Carlist intrigue. A rumor is cursent that Don Carlos is on the frantier. There have lately been a large number of incendiary fires here, and the authorities have redoubled their vigilance.

France and Prussia have recognized the Spanish Regency. The sessions of the Cortes have been suspended until October. Previous to the adjournment, the Cortes appointed a commission to supervise affairs during the in-

termission. Lisbon, July 17.—The Hon. Samuel Shellabarger yesterday had an audience with the King, and presented his credentials as Minis-

ter from the United States. Berlin, July 17.—Deputy Mende has been sentenced to one year, and three workmen to three months' imprisonment, for complicity

in the Dusseldorf riots. St. Petersburg, July 17.—The Czar forbids the attendance of the Russian bishops at the

Œcumenical Council. London, July 17.—Advices from Rio Janeiro to June 20 fully confirm the reported victory of the allies over Lopez. The Paraguayans lost 500 killed and wounded, 300 prisoners, and 12 guns. A treaty establishing a provisional government for Paraguay has been

Hong Kong, June 24, via London, July 17. -A proclamation denouncing foreigners has been extensively posted in the towns and villages on the Yangtze river, by the agents of a secret society. A conspiracy has been discovered at Foochow, having for its object the opening of another Toeping rebellion. It is rumored that over 50,000 men are con-

nected with the movement. Advices from Yokohama to June 16 have been received. The naval and military forces of the Mikado had commenced an attack on the rebels at Hakodadi. The result was

unknown. HAVANA, July 17 .- Sickness is increasing in the ranks of the Spanish and rebel forces. The mortality is frightful, and it is estimated that the deaths amount to fifteen per cent. monthly of the men in the field on both sides. The Spanish troops are afflicted most with vomito, while the rebels suffer from cholera and diarrhoea. When the hot and rainy season is over the volunteers will go into active service in the field, and reinforcements will arrive from Spain.

Several thousand Remington rifles were hipped yesterday for Sagua la Grande, Remedios, and Nuevitas, to arm the volumteers about to take the field against the rebels.

Ground Rents and Mortgages.
Section 1. The Select and Common Councils of: If City of Philadelphia do ordain, That the Mayor: Philadelphia be and he is hereby authorized to bor row, at not less than par, on the credit of the city from time to time, seven hundred thousand dollars for the payment of ground rents and mortgages held against the city, for which interest not to exceed the rate of six per cent. per annum shall be paid, half yearly, on the first days of January and July, at the office of the City Treasurer. The principal of said loan shall be payable and paid at the expiration of thirty years from the date of the same, and not before, without the consent of the holders thereof; and the certificates therefor, in the usual form of the certificates the certificates therefor, in the usual form of the cer-tificates of city loan, shall be issued in such amounts as the lenders may require, but not for any fractional part of one hundred dollars, or, if required, in amounts of five hundred or one thousand dollars; and it shall be expressed in sald certificates that the

loan therein mentioned and the interest thereof are payable free from all taxes.

Section 2. Whenever any loan shall be made by virtue thereof; there shall be, by force of this ordinance, annually appropriated out of the income of the corporate estates, and from the sum raised by taxation, a sum sufficient to pay the interest on said certificates, and the further sum of three-tenths of one per centum on the par value of such certificates so issued shall be appropriated quarterly out of said income and taxes to a sinking fund, which fund and its accumulations are hereby especially pledged for the redemption and payment of said certificates. loan therein mentioned and the interest thereof are
