From Our Own Correspondent. NEW YORK, July 22, 1869. The opportunities for

Pomotogical Spicide which the green fruiterers who ply their trade on the Broadway curbstones provide, are being freely made use of, and cholera morbus must be expected to be on the increase until the green fruit shall have become mellow. This will not be for some weeks, and consequently the cholera morbus people will have it all their own way until then. They have the matter in their own hands. Both the cholera and yellow fever seem kindly disposed towards the city this year. Hitherto they have tapped but lightly at our doors, and have not insisted upon coming in and making themselves at home. We are fervently hoping that the season has gone by for cholera to slay its thousands and yellow fever its tens of thousands. The Board of Health, to be sure, are doing all in their power to lay the city subject to an epidemic. The streets in certain quarters are choked up with garbage, and wherever the tenement-house element prevails, there do you find also the elements of contagious disease. But although the weather of the past few days has been eminently favorable to contagion, the deaths-even of infants from cholera infantum-have been few, and less than the usual percentage of funerals have visited the cemeteries and burial grounds.

City Hall Park

is going to be reclaimed. The greater portion of it is at present an arid-looking plain fenced in by iron rails, around which are posted the venders of penny songs, ice-cream one cent a glass and two spoons at that, solferino-colored lemonade, Washington pies, cholera-producing warranted waffles, oyster soup, seaweed tobacco, and other delicacles. Ropers-in, bummers, loafers, and the dregs from gambling-hells infest It by day, and abominable creatures a shade lower than all these convert It into a silent, furtive pandemonium at night. Let such disport themselves while they can, for the end of these things is at hand. Simultaneously with the commencement of the new post office, an effort is to be made to reclaim the City Hall Park. The long-contemplated plaza is to be built. Decent brick is to pave the parched and colorless area that now extends south of the old City Hall, and handsome plats of green, fringed with flower-borders, are to interstice the space between the old and the new buildings. All trees of respectable growth are to be retained, and the idea is to make the at present demoralized City Hall Park one of the most beautiful and useful spots in the city. Of course, Mayor Hall will be permitted to fire off cannon there whenever any of his friends go yachting, or any other event of national importance occurs. A Frightened Editor.
