#### MEWS SUMMARY.

City Affairs. -Rarely has there been so large a supply of fruit and vegetables in the Philadelphia markets thus early in the season as at the present time. Potatoes have for several weeks been coming into the city in quantities so far in excess of the demand that prices have fallen steadily, until from a dollar and a half per basket they can now e bought for thirty-five to forty cents.; tomatoes plenty, and sell at from fifty to seventy-five cents the basket; egg-plants from one dollar to a dollar and a quarter; and watermelons (from the South) at twenty-five dollars the hundred; apples of good quality could be bought yester-day at from sixty to seventy-five cents the basket, and few buyers even at that price. Berries are also abundant, and retail at from ten to twelve cents the quart. The supply of peaches is not good, it being to early in the season yet to look for this favorite fruit in abundance. The

crop promises, however, to be very large. A well-executed counterfeit twenty-dollar note, copied after the Treasury issue, has just been put in circulation in Philadelphia, and a number of them taken by shopkeepers and others. A very large number of counterfeits of the various denominations of Iractional earrency are in circulation in this city, passing, some of them, from hand to hand daily. So far as is known, the Treasury Department has no detective force in this city, to look after counterfeiters and the circulators of counterfeit money at no time in the last eight or ten years has there been a greater necessity for a police for that special service than now.

The Select and Common Councils of he City of Philadelphia do ordain, That the Mayors: Philadelphia be and he is hereby authorized to bor row, at not less than par, on the credit of the city from time to time, seven hundred thousand doilars for the payment of ground rents and mortgages held against the city, for which interest not to exceed the rate of six per cent. per annum shall be paid, half yearly, on the first days of January and July, at the office of the City Treasurer. The principal of said loan shall be payable and paid at the expiration of thirty years from the date of the same, and not before, without the consent of the holders thereof; and the certificates therefor, in the usual form of the certificates of city loan, shall be issued in such amounts as the lenders may require, but not for any fractional as the lenders may require, but not for any fractional part of one hundred dollars, or, if required, in amounts of five hundred or one thousand dollars; and it shall be expressed in said certificates that the loan therein mentioned and the interest thereof are

loan therein mentioned and the interest thereof are payable free from all taxes.

Section 2. Whenever any loan shall be made by virtue thereof: there shall be, by force of this ordinance, annually appropriated out of the income of the corporate estates, and from the sum raised by taxation, a sum sufficient to pay the interest on said certificates, and the further sum of three-tenths of once per centum on the nar value of such certificates. one per centum on the par value of such certificate so issued shall be appropriated quarterly out of said income and taxes to a sinking fund, which fund and its accumulations are hereby especially pledged for the redemption and payment of said certifi-
