## AT SARATOGA.

From an Occasional Correspondent.

SARATOGA SPRINGS, Aug. 2. F On Thursday afternoon we took rail at Montreal for Plattsburg, N. Y., which place we reached before dark. It is prettily situated near the north end or foot of Lake Champlain, and shows considerable signs of progress and active industry. The comparison with such places as Cobourg, Kingston, and other Canadian towns is much in our favor. Last year the business part of Plattsburg was almost entirely destroyed by fire. but the new brick buildings, factories, and fine stores, sprung up in every direction, have almost obliterated the traces of the culamity, and show the recuperative energy of the population. On the lake off this town is the field of the gallant McDonough's funcus victory, the story of which is familiar to all versed in American history. Our ride through Lake Champlain the next day we all enjoyed exceedingly. The elegant steamer Adirondack is as com/ortable and well appointed a conveyance as we could wish for, very different from the ill-kept and overcrowded British steamers on Lake Ontario and the St. Lawrence. Everything was conducted with system and quietness, and added much to our pleasure in viewing the varied and beautiful scenery of this noble lake.

Its extreme length is about 150 miles ; our route to Ticonderoga about 100. The lofty peaks of Mount Mansfield and Comer's Hump of the Green Mountains on one side, and Mount Marcy and Dix Peak of the Adirondack range on the other, were in prominent view most of the time. Mount Marcy is 5400 feet high, but a few hundred feet lower than Mount Washington.

At Ticonderoga five stages filled with passengers to Lake George made the four miles land transit very lively-the proprietor of the line making us several impromptu speeches and relating anecdotes as we stopped at "Old Fort Ti," or its ruins, and other objects of historical interest on the way.

We found the cosy little steamer Minnehaha at her landing, ready to take us up Lake George. This sheet of water is thirty-six miles long, and is full of romantic interest and Revolutionary associations. It seems as if dropped in the midst of the mountains, and is 240 feet above the level of the Hudson river. Many call it superior to Lake Como, but here I do not agree with them. "Rogers' Slide," "Sabbath Day Point," "Rattlesnake" and "Black" Mountains all have their interesting history. At the southern end or head of the lake are interspersed hundreds of charming islands, said to equal in number the days of the year. Many a pleasant little cottage and some elegant summer residences we passed on the route. There are a dozen or more fishing resorts, where lake trout can be caught weighing ten or fitteen pounds apiece.

Long before reaching Caldwell, "Fort William Henry" Hotel looms up conspicuously in the distauce. It is a very large building, in the imposing style of architecture of the Tuileries, with a wide piazza extending along the entire front nearly 350 feet; a beautiful fountain plays in the grounds before the hotel, and a band of music welcomes the new arrivals in dulcet strains that echo sweetly among the neighboring hills. There are about four hundred rooms in this capacious establishment, which is well kept, and will prove quite an attraction to tourists and others. Small boats are numerous and always at command at moderate rates for rowing or fishing, and a tiny steamer, the "Ganouskie," is to be had for excursion parties among the islands. A few weeks can be passed pleasantly here. Saturday afternoon, at 3 o'clock, we took stage for Glen's Falls, thence by cars to these far-famed springs, about which it seems useless for me to say anything except that it is more enlivening and gayer here than I ever saw it in its old days, twenty years ago. Union Hotel, Congress Hall, and the Clarendon contain whole villages of population in themselves. We occupy a cottage on the grounds of the Union, and have a walk of a quarter of a mile to the dining-hall. Everything around is gayety and fashion, and all sorts and conditions of people are here. Every nook and corner seems full. The favorite springs are as crowded as ever with devotees of health or fashion, morning and evening. "Old Congress" seems to still retain the ascendancy, and is as worthy of it as ever. "Empire," "Star," and "Saratoga" Springs have come into favorable notice within a few years past. "High Rock" also demands attention. Other than the excitement of a crowd and fashionable life in its various phases, there is little of interest to the simple visitor, and I shall be glad to get away. Gen. Grant, I learn, will be at Congress Hall next week, which will be one of the events of the season. From present appearances, the residents and hotel proprietors may congratulate themselves on a successful season.

A feature of the camp has been the daily | children's meeting at 1:30 o'clock. They have been attended by all the children, and have been of great benefit upon the minds of those who are destined to make their mark in the years come. The weather is charmingly delightful. # The Great Cave of Eastern Nevada,

From the Shermantown Telegrar Eighty-five miles to the southwest of White Pine, in one of the lowest foothills of the Snell Creek range, is located the great cave of Eastern Nevada. Its direct situation is a singular freak of nature, for the ridge in which it i-located extends for a mile and a half out into the valley (a branch of Steptoe valley), and as no point will it exceed sixty feet in height. A story is current that at the time the followers of Joe Smith were daily expecting an open rupture with the United States Government, this cave was known to the high chief and elders of the Mormon Church, and that they brought all their plats and treasure and secreted them in some of the many chambers in this cavern. It was first dis overed by a white man (Mormons are not inluded in this country's interpretation of the meaning of that phrase), in or about March 1866. Being unprepared with the necessary lights and safeguard twine, they did not ven-ture in far. Indians hold it in superstitious horror, and their account of "heap Injuns" coing far in and never returning, and one old Indian, who is styled by the white settlers the 'Cave Indian," a great many moons ago gola far in with a number of his tribe, and that they travelled a long time and finally came to a gushing stream of water, on the banks of which grew evergreens and beautiful flowers and that a great many Indians lived near by who had dwarf ponies and beautiful squaws According to him, this Indian did not like to live in the bowels of mother earth, but would rather "chase the antelope over the plain," snare the rabbit and spear the spotted front, so when all were lost in sleep he stole away, and after a long time, suffering much, he finally, more deal than alive, reached into daylight and rejoleed. This is firmly believed by the Indians, and even now it is only when the storm is more sever that one will drag his limbs just inside the protection of the hanging wall, and while there x111 fairly shake with fear. The entrance would hardly be noticed by travellers, it being very low and continuing some twenty feet; then it gradually grows higher and broader. Many of the chambers are of great size, the most interesting one being styled "dancing hall." This apartment is at least 60 by 80 feet, and 40 in height: the floor is of fine sandstone, and very even; convenient to it are smaller apart. ments, styled the ladies' dressing-room, and refreshment saloon; and near by the most singular spring, with nice-tasting water, gushes up through erevices in the rock. Further in the darkness increases, and the ceilings of many of the chambers are literally covered with stalactites of various shapes and forms. Stalag mites also are thick on the floors. It is not known what distance this subterraneous passage extends, but parties have been in four thousand feet, without coming to the end of the main passage, a deep cut or jump there prevents one going further. TUESDAY, Aug. 3 .- This great Feast of Tabernacles is in successful operation.

The daily congregation of those who are encamped upon the ground numbers about one thousand people. On Sabbath it is estimated that not less than fifteen thousand people were upon the ground. Notwithstanding this vast crowd the order was very good. Not a single arrest was made, although a very efficient police force were on duty, under the direction of Officer Lyons, of Reading.

The public preaching services were conducted on Sabbath by Rev. Dr. R. H. Pattison, Rev. Mr. Smith, of Columbia, and Rev. C. J. Thompson, of Harrisburg. On Saturday, Rev. J. B. Ayars. of Germantown, Rev. C. F. Turner, of Lancaster, and Rev. T. A. Fernley, of Reading, officlated. All the sermons were pure gospel efforts, and produced fine religious impressions.

Yesterday the meetings were more interesting and powerful than at any former stage of the meeting. Rev. Mr. Coleman, a superannuated minister of Troy Conference, preached in the morning, Rev. B. W. Gorham in the afternoon. and Rev. G. G. Rakestraw, of Harrisburg, in the evening. This morning Rev. J. B. McCullough. of Philadelphia, preached with fine effect, and the Rev. Mr. Gordon this afternoon. All the exercises of the camp are conducted with all the regularity and exactitude of regular church services. The camp will close on Friday morning.

There are in all about fifty ministers on the ground. Rev. Henry Boehm, the oldest living minister perhaps in the United States, came on the ground yesterday, and will preach to-morrow morning. He was the travelling companion of Bishop Asbury, the first American Bishop, Rev. Adam Wallace, editor of the Methodist Home Journal, is also on the ground, but his pressing engagements will prevent him from gratifying his friends by preaching.
