An Impending Peril.



ANOTHER PROBABLE HOMICIDE.

The Result of a Bar-room Altercation. James Maguire, aged about twenty-two years, was admitted into the Pennsylvania Hospital last evening with a dangerous wound in his left breast, received during an altereation on New Market street, above Willow. It appears that about 5 o'clock last evening, Maguire, with Thomas Dornan, aged seventeen years, had gone into the lager beer saloon of William Leck-teld, No. 445 New Market street, where they met a third party. Calling for drinks, they were told they could not have any as they already had had too much liquor. They then sat down awhile, after which Dornan went into the street, closely followed by Magnire, who sat down on the step, and feeling sick, commenced vomiting on the pavement. Mrs. Leekfeld brought out a bucket of water, and in throwing it on the filth. splashed some of it on Magnire, who became angry, and pulling out a kulfe, dared Mrs. Leekfeld to come out, saying he would give her some of that (the knife). A club was then thrown out of the place, which struck Dornan on the head. He then attempted to get Magnire away, but the latter refused, and started up the steps. Mrs. Leckfeld had by this time secured another club, with which she hat Maguire several times Maguire then went into the street, and picking up a brick threw it at Mrs. Leekfeld, but she got out of the way in time to avoid the missile. Mr. Leckteld, who had taken but little part in the affray up to this time, then appeared on the scene with a revolver, which he discharged, the ball lodging in Maguire's breast. Maguire was picked up and taken to the Fennsylvania Hospital, where his wound was examined, but owing to the fact that he was intoxicated, the physicians concluded not to probe for the ball until this morning. It is believed that the wound is a dangerous one. Leekfeld was arrested by Policeman Mulligan, of the Seventh district, and taken to the Central Station. Thomas Dorman was also taken into custody and escorted to the Central Station. Leckfeld was given a hearing about 9 o'cleck, and, after Dornan had related his ac-court of the affair, was committed by Justice Ker! to await the result of the injuries sustained by Haguire. Dornan was required to enter ball for his appearance as a witness to-day. The in-jured man resided on Germantown road, near Jeffirson street. In January last he was ar-rested and convlcted of a charge of stealing cot-ton waste from a strengt of stealing cotton waste from a store at American and Mager streets. He served out an imprisonment of sx months on this charge, and had only been released from jail on the 19th of July.


