MEXICO.

Massrcre of American Citizens. "correspondent writes from the City of

Mexico on the 22d ult .:-News has been received here that the American colony at Tuxpan had been attacked by native Mexicans, and several of their number killed, the remainder being compelled to abanbon their holdings and take refuge in the town What adds to the infamy of this uncalled-for massacre is the generally believed opinion that it was performed at the instigation of various wealthy men (?) for the purpose of terrifying the Americans, and, by inducing them to leave obtain possession of their lands, which, it is supposed, would become extremely valuable, as it is believed that a railroad will pass through them. This is the second massacre of American citizens which as taken place in a short time and Americans are inquiring very seriously i the Government is forgetting the duty it owe to its citizens, and whether they possess no other rights than those graciously allorded them by this Mexican Canalla, whose prevailing charac-teristics seem to be, and undoubtedly are, murder, robbery, and extortion. The lives of those who have fallen victims to Mexican cowardice and treachery cannot be brought back, but a stein reckoning can be demanded of the Gov ernment of Mexico, if it permits the perpetration with impunity of those outrages which are a blot upon the civilization of the age and an everlast ing disgrace to the country in which they are perpetrated. The feeling is that the blood of Americans which has been so wantonly shed will not remain long unavenged by the Government at Washington, and hope is entertained by all that speedy reparation will promptly be exacted. 1 think that the Juarez Government will. and decidedly ought to, take a prompt initiative in bringing the perpetrators of this crime to jus tice, and, by making an example of the authors of it, teach a lesson not easily forgotten to all the other miscreants who may be meditating like

horrors. The Condition of the Country.

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The following is a copy of a letter from Mr. Romero, received by Mr. Henry Clews, of New York city:

MEXICO, July 23.-Henry Clews, Esq.-My Dear Sir:-It gives me pleasure to inform you that the political condition of things in this country is improving. Public peace is being consolidated. The result of our elections to Congress is satisfactory. Unfortunately, however, the financial condition of the country is not so satisfactory.

What we want now, and must have, is capital and enterprise to build some railroads which are necessary for the development of the country, and which would be very profitable undertaking and for the actual development of the natural re-sources of Mexico. We have large fields near the coast and in the interior, where large amounts of fine sugar could be produced with comparatively small expense if we only have the capital neces sary to bring the machinery and defray the preliminary expenses. We have two rich mines, which caunot be worked on a proper seale for want of capital.

It is not likely we could obtain here the necessary capital, for two reasons:-

1st. Because we are poor now, and very likely

there does not exist in the country the necessary capital for all that. 2d. Because there is not yet sufficient confidence felt in the future to warrant the investment of large sums of money. Besides, a large number of Mexicans of means are either out of the country or have sent their means out for fear of new troubles occurring here.

If this matter could be properly presented in the United States, and the people had confidence enough in the future of Mexico, a great good
