#### NEWS SUMMARY.

City Affairs.

-At the regular meeting of the Board of School Controllers held yesterday afternoon, Mr. Freeborn called attention to the fact that in some of the sections the vacation had commenced several days earlier than in others, and he thought there should be uniformity both in the closing and opening of the schools. He had learned that German is taught in one or more of the schools by outside teachers, and elocution also. If the School Controllers have the power over such matters they are supposed to have, it is time it was exercised. The matter was referred to the Committee on Schools. Mr. Hickok offered as an amendment to the by-laws, that no pupil in any school under the jurisdiction of the board shall be required to memorize or give verbatim recitations of the text of the Constitution of the United States; neither shall it be required of applicants for teachers' certificates at the semi-annual examinations, Verbatim recitations of the Constitution shall not be counted in the averages. Under the rules, the proposed amendment cannot be acted upon until the next stated meeting.

 An adjourned meeting of delegates from the various Trades Unions of the city was held last evening at the Schuylkill Hose House, T. F. Ross was appointed Chairman, and Frederick Baker Secretary. The credentials of a number of delegates were presented. The Chairman alluded in feeling terms to the death of the late Mr. Sylvis, President of the National Labor Association. He also referred to the Labor Congress which will meet in this city on the 16th of the present month, and urged upon all present to use their efforts to acquaint the members of the different trades of the important gathering.

-Mr. Joseph R. Lorant, of Brooklyn, reached this city yesterday, in search of two men, whom he charged with stealing from him lace veils, silks, etc., valued at five thousand dollars. By the aid of Detective Cobb and others the alleged fugitives were found at a house in Buttonwood street, and all the property was recovered. The prisoners had a hearing before Alderman Kerr, when Mr. Lorant testified that one of the accused lived with him, and that upon his going home one day he found that all his goods had been removed. The prisoners were held for a hearing in two weeks.

-Thomas Price, 39 years old, while working yesterday on a steamboat at Arch street wharf, fell into the hold and was badly injured internally. He was taken to the Pennsylvania Hospital.

-Last evening, about 7 o'clock, several cars filled with coal ran off the track of the connecting railroad while passing through the tunnel at Thirty-second and Market streets, and were completely demolished. The coal was scattered in all directions, and considerable loss was sustained thereby. As far as ascertained, no one was injured.

The Albany and Susquehanna Railrond War. BINGHAMTON, Aug. 10.—The managers of the Eric Railway Company are busy this morn-ing preparing to prosecute the Albany and Susquehanna Railroad. Very little trustworthy in-formation concerning the position of the case can be ascertained, but, as usual in such affairs, the streets are full of rumors.

Two special trains, filled with workmen, or 'guerillas," so called, left this city this morning efore 9 o'clock, on the Albany and Susquehann Road, in Eric Railroad cars. The party consisted of 350 men, under charge of S. D. Rucker, General Superintendent of the Eric Road, and H. D. Pratt, Division Agent. They took with them a good supply of beef and floar, and appeared more like men on a military expedition than a civil

Most of the men heretofore employed on this end of the Albany and Susquehauna Rallroad are now lying idle. Up to noon no trains have arrived from Albany since yesterday morning. It is reported that the train which left here last night was seized at Afton by a large force of men in the Ramsey Interest.
