were smashed to atoms, and a large quantity of fish and oil destroyed. The steamer New York narrowly escaped loss with all on board. She was driven ashore and lost both anchors and rudder. Many merchants here have lost all their property. The heaviest losses are:—J. & 8. Griffin, \$10,000; E. W. French, \$6000. J. & S. Griffin lost all their vessels, fish, and storehouses, J. S. Pearce lost his store and all his stock. Most of our fishing vessels are in pieces. The Cale at Eastport.

Eastport, Oct. 6, via Bangor, Oct. 9.— Twenty-seven vessels are ashore in Runney's The schooners Romp and Percy were badly damaged. The schooner Rio was lost in St. Andrew's Bay, with all on board. A barque at New river was lost, with all on board, seventeen in number. Grand Menan Island is swept, with all the welrs and smoke-houses. The towns of Lubec, Pembroke, and Perry lose heavily. This tornado has done more damage to Eastport than the great fire did. The vessels ashore are as follows:-Sarah, Ward, Rob, M. J. Laughton, Margie, Conroy, Boston, Starlight, Speedwell, Empress, Burns, Belle, Debonnaire, Willie, Mowe, and others. The Convoy, Speedwell, Commodore, and some others are complete wrecks. The revenue cutter Norswood was disabled at the beginning of the storm, and could render no assistance. All the smokehouses are down. The loss cannot be less than \$500,000. A large part of the town is a perfect wreck. The Gale at Lewiston.

Lewiston, Me., Oct. 9-Evening, -The Jour-nal has a report of a great freshet in Swift river, in Oxford county, showing a rise of thirty-six feet in twelve hours in that stream, which is a tributary of the Androscoggin. The improve-ments of the Denniston Steam Mill Company. for lumbering operations, were destroyed, and their large dam washed away. Scores of farms were covered several feet deep with sand, and many houses and barns were demolished. The people barely escaped with their lives, and with children in their arms, to the mountains. The farmers living on the river are impoverished and homeless.
