The Cuban Question in the United States—Enforcement of our Neutrality Laws—The Administration and Cuban Agents—Why the United States Did Not Join with Spain and Mexico in Reconquering Cuba—Reply of the Spanish Government to Sisk's Note.

There have been so many rumors in connection with facts relative to the Cuban question, that the real situation of affairs seems generally to be imperfectly understood. It is a fact that ever since the present administration came into power efforts have been made in good faith to enforce the Neutrality laws, both against the Spanish Government and the agents of the Cubans in this country.

On the presentation or reception of such official or other trustworthy information, either from our own officers or those acting for the Spanish Government, as justified proceedings in the premises, while sedulously endeavoring to strictly observe the Neutrality Laws, the Government has frequently been approached by agents or alleged ministers, acting on behalf of the Cubans, desiring the recognition of belligerent rights in other words, they may be said to be on the same national footing with Spain.

The reasons for not recognizing in such cases are based upon the law of nations, the condition of the island not justifying, in the opinion of the Administration, the recognition of Cuban rights. Not that any satisfactory evidence has been produced to show that there is a de facto government of the Cubans, possessing the powers essential to its maintenance and character.

The sympathy of the Government has always been with the Cubans but this, under the peculiar existing circumstances attending the question, could not be distinctly manifested by official acts in connection with movements in the field; it is known that the Government has recently sought to induce Spain to consent to the independence of the island, and thus avoid further bloodshed.
