The State Republican by 25:000 Majority-The Aparty that Prevalled in the state.

Despatch to The Evening Tolegraph. CHICAGO, Oct. 14.—The Iowa election returns are slowly coming in. The vote was very light, and the Republican majority will be from 25,000 to 30,000. In many counties the Democrats had no ticket, and the Republicans hardly took the trouble to vote. Sioux City went Republican for the first time. In Muscatine no county ticket was run by the Democrats, and the vote was hardly one-third of the full vote. The majority for the Republicans is reported at 600, a heavy falling off. Fourteen countles give about 10,000 Republican majority. The city of Burlington gave over 500 Republican majority. Tama county goes Republican by 1000 majority, and the following other Republican majorities are reported: -Poweshelk county, 800; Minnishick, 800. Lee county went Democratic by 800 majority.

after leaving the mouth of the Mississippi, the passengers and crew took to their small boats, but one of them, which parted company in the gale, was not heard from until a few days ago. The following particulars of the severe trials of the four men are furnished us by one of them. Mr. Twomey:

On the twenty-sixth they found themselves no longer able to keep in the neighborhood of the other boats, as the wind was strong and the sea running high. They were provided with nothing more than two blanksts, two oars, and a half a bottle of fresh water. A few pieces of hard bread were ruined by salt water.

When they saw themselves alone in an open boat, with a rolling sea and a strong breeze, nothing more could be done than to keep their pinnace from swamping, and drifting helplessly, with a faint attempt to head for the land, but their efforts were valu. The wind drove them southward, each man endeavoring to retain the points of the compass, during the day by the sun, and at night by the north star. Only on one occasion were their hopes of derivery heightened when the smoke of a steamer was seen a long way ort, but that was all. When five days out their sufferings, of course, be-

was all all the state of the state of the state of the small quantities of rain water were saved, sufficient to moisten their parched threats. One of the men was so far gone as to resort to sea water, drinking half a bottle of it with apparent relish. Sharks kept near the skiff, and their constant presence was more than annoying, but men who are familialing may find

than annoying, but men who are famishing may find even an enemy of service. With labor and repeated ciforts one of the small man-caters was captured and caten; but Twomey says that raw shark, even with a collapsed stothach, is not a dainty dish, though it beats nothing all to pieces.

The first vessel they sighted was the schooner Abbic Campbell, lying about one bundred and fifty miles to the southward of Southwest Pass. Under the circumstances, it would be difficult to imagine their sensations. Their boat was leaking builty and reduced to one oar, while the blanker had been torn in strips to stop the leaks. They did not possess sufficient strength to move the skiff, and had nothing to signal with. The single idea was to make the schooner observe them. They were not long in susschooner observe them. They were not long in suspense, for Captain Denison by chance saw them, and at once sent off his cutter to the rescue.

All four of the unfortunates, when sure of safety, sank exhausted and became fully aware of their miserable condition. The excitement and doubts past, nature demanded reparation for the strain. Captain Denison took them on board, treating them most humanely, relieving their sad necessities gra-dually, not allowing them to gorge with food or water, and under his treatment the men immediately

hegan to recover.

As soon as the wind permitted, the schooner made sail for Pensacola, where she arrived on the 6th instant, and when the steamship Lizzie came down from Milton, Captain Felsher learned the condition of the wrecked men, and kindly effered them a free passage to this city. His generosity did not stop at that, but he solicited a purse from his passengers, and a neat sum was quickly made up, which gave the wrecked party a start on retarning from the awful

dangers of the deep. Thus it will be seen that, although the Trade Wind went to Davy Jones locker, none of her in-habitants followed her to the bottom, and only one death ensued—that of the fireman in Captain Morril's boat, who, when delitions from thirst and famine, wildly threw himself into the sea and was no more of earth.
