The President at the State Fair at Frederick. FREDERICK, Md., Oct. 14 .- There were large crowds collected to-day, to receive the President in this city. Colonel W. P. Maulsby warmly welcomed him in a speech, and expressed the thanks of the multitude for his presence on this

occasion. The President replied:—
"I have great pleasure in visiting, for the first time, the city of Frederick, of which I have heard so much during the period of the late Rebellion, and which, too, stood up manfully for the maintenance of a whole Union. I expected to yield this city some years are to visit this city some years ago, but found myself unable to do so; but now that I have found so many friends, and have been so gratified with what I have seen at your fair, and enjoyed of your hospitality, I hope at some future time to visit you again.

The President was loudly cheered, and in the committee room received the multitude, shaking hands as they severally passed before him. It should have been stated that Secretary Cox was

SPAIN.

Valencia Still Holds Out-Another City Revolts Battles Suppression of Newspapers The Conduct of the Republican Members of

the Cortes-Porto Rico Deputies.

Madrid, Oct. 14.—Valencia still holds out against the troops. An official despatch states that the insurgents have proposed to capitulate, but the authorities demand an unconditional submission. The town of Beja has revolted, and the inhabitants are flying. Troops have been sent to restore order. Six thousand rebels have submitted to the Government officers in Tarragona, Barcelona, and vicinity. The republican leaders, Paul and Salvoctea, abandoned by their followers, have fled to Gibraltar.

The latter, after leaving Saragossa, was defeated while retiring through Audalusia, and 70 of his men were killed and the remainder dispersed. A number of Republican journals published in

the provinces have been suppressed by the local authorities for inciting insurrection.

The deputies to the Cortes, composing the republican minority, have absented themselves from the Chamber, and many are supposed to be concealed in this city or vicinity. It is rumored that the Government intends to arrest

them, under authority of the late act suspending individual rights. The committee appointed by the Cortes to inquire into the conduct of the Republican deputies in the present insurrection, recommend that a vote of censure be passed against the Re-publican minority for leaving their seats in the House, and that legal proceedings be commenced against those deputies who have taken an active part in the rebellion. The Cortes has passed a vote of thanks to the defenders of Los Tunas, in Cuba. Deputies from Porto Rico have appeared in the Cortes. One of their first acts was to present a demand for colonial liberties and

reforms. This gave rise to an interesting debate. Deputy Arrrya alluded to the unswerving fidelity of Porto Rico, and declared that its union, through love, with Spain, would be greatly strengthened by the conferring of the liberties General Prim praised the heroism of the defenders of the mother country in the An-

The Reply to Sickles' Note-The Note Received with Good Will, but Foreign Mediation Declined.

MADRID, Oct. 14.—The Epoca of to-day publishes a synopsis of the reply made by Minister Silvela to Sickles' note. Silvela says reasons dictated by national dignity prevents the ac-ceptance of foreign mediation in domestic affairs. The intimations made by Sickles are received with the goodwill which one nation owes to another with which it is bound by the ties of amity. It is presumed that the American Government only desires to strip the struggle in Cuba of its sanguinary character. The ington Cabinet is urged to impede the departure of supplies to the insurgents, who prevent the Spanish Government from carrying out a policy in Cuba in harmony with that at home. Silvela maintains that the insurgents of Cuba are in the the minority, and by no means belong to the wealthiest and most influential classes.

The Epoca mentions the conferences between Senor Silvela and General Sickles, in which the former urged the release of the Spanish gun-boats building in the United States, protesting that they were only to be used to protect the shores of Cuba against expeditions in aid of the insurgents from foreign countries.

The Government was disposed to employ every means to promote the interests of the colony of Porto Rico.
