

NEW YORKISMS.

From Our Own Correspondent. NEW YORK, Oct. 22, 1869. Miss Miss Moran, the lady who reports cattle for the daily Times, and who would have reported 'Tere Hyacinthe' had that ecclesiastic been accessible to any one, is a lady who will see thirty-five before she will see thirty. You could not hear her talk for the space of one minute without coming to the conclusion that she was Irish by birth—and the conclusion would be a correct one. She was the guest of Charlotte Cushman; her society was sought after by Prince Poniatowski; Victor Emanuel commissioned her to buy horses for him; the American Minister gave her a letter of introduction to Mr. Higelow, the then editor-in-chief of the Times. Thus gabbles gossip. From that hour to this her noble proportions have been seen at home sales, races, and in drove-yards. She speaks several languages, and has that perfectly self-sufficient, but not necessarily disagreeable, manner which distinguishes the woman who has seen a good deal of life. There are male reporters who regard her with bashful envy, but being (as Anna Dickinson would say) "pre-eminent" in her sphere, she can afford to regard them with indifference, or not to regard them at all.

The American Institute Fair will commence its last week on Monday. The Skating rink, at the intersection of SIXTY-third street and Third avenue, possesses natural advantages for showing of the brilliant heterogeneity of the Fair; and the first glances which the visitor gets at it presents him with a very pleasing and varied picture. There are no very special features evident this year, unless the electrical organ be one. This evening the Fat Men's Association intends visiting it, and I hope the unctuous ponderosity of their footsteps will not break through the flooring. The exhibition of fruit has been quite fine, and occupies the space immediately opposite the western entrance. The distribution of premiums is to take place to-morrow evening week.

The Brides' Bonnets. Knowledge as I have of human nature, human nature, and of that department of human nature which manifests itself in the glances which the eyes cast upon the brides' bonnets; I have examined one of them with a view to the subject, that profound contemplation, which the amazing nature of the subject seems to demand. In this city, particularly, you may see them in all their magnificence in the Third avenue cars on Thursday afternoons. That shining, well-soaped face; that sprawling purple tie; those worn and dirty gloves, since bright lines of dingy, one only pulled completely on, the other left half off; those tight-set teeth; those saucy, crisp, puckered, parted lips; the impudent, brazen air which concentrates in the face and pervades the figure; those series of hitches at the skirt and waist, evincing feverish anxiety as to the set of the garments; and, last of all, that miraculous jockey-hat (I called it bonnet, hoping to soften the term), in which all colors are compressed, so as to present the greatest combination in the smallest space! I know them all. This is the Biddy of the period; and this is her Thursday out. The Third Avenue cars are thick with them, and when every bad fortune ordains one to ride therein, I cannot escape this exhibition of depraved millinery which greets me on every side.

MUSICAL AND DRAMATIC. The City Amusements. AT THE CHESTNUT THEATRE will be performed this evening. It is a genuine treat to see a really entertaining play well represented in all particulars, and it is gratifying to find that the Chestnut is now taking its proper position as the model theatre of Philadelphia. AT THE WALNUT Mr. Booth will have a benefit this evening, when he will appear as 'Richard III' in 'The Merchant of Venice,' and as 'Don Cesar de Bazar' in the popular drama of that name. There will be a matinee to-morrow, when 'Don Cesar de Bazar' and 'The Merchant of Venice' will be given. 'Richard III' is announced for to-morrow evening. A new drama entitled 'Last of Sea,' by Boucault and H. J. Byron, is underlined. AT THE ARCH the comedy of the 'Sealions Wife' and the farce of 'The Windmill' are announced for this evening. AT THE ELEVENTH STREET OPERA HOUSE an attractive programme will be presented this evening. The Circus will continue to perform on Eighth street, between Race and Vine, to-morrow. On Monday it will appear at Bristol, on Tuesday at Princeton, N. J., and on Wednesday at Halloway, N. J.

The SEATZ-HARLER ORCHESTRA will give the first matinee of the season at Musical Fund Hall to-morrow afternoon. A fine programme will be presented. A GRAND VOCAL and Instrumental Concert will be given at the Academy of Music on 'Thursday' evening next, for the benefit of the German Theatre. The concert will be under the direction of Mr. Isaac L. Rice, which is a guarantee of the excellence of the entertainment, and as the only one that deserves support, we hope that there will be a full house. The project of a German Theatre is of more importance than many persons suppose. We have a very large German population, who have the best-class places of amusement of their own, and this theatre will supply a desideratum. It will be one of the attractions of the city, and an inducement for Germans from the interior of the State to settle in this city for purposes of business or pleasure. The gentlemen who have inaugurated this theatre enterprise have had in their minds the minds from the beginning, and it would be seen that the entire business community is interested. The managers have already purchased a lot of ground, and they intend to begin in the spring, if all goes well. They are determined, however, very wisely, to have all, or at least a large portion, of the money in hand before they begin, so that there will be no trouble in the future. The theatre will be an ornament to the city, and will supply a class of amusements, both musical and dramatic, that can be enjoyed as well by our English-speaking citizens as by the Germans. We hope that our business men and public-spirited citizens will come forward and aid the enterprise as it deserves.

BRIBERY. Corruption in Ireland. There is as much corruption in the 'quid' 'quid' as in some sections of this country. It is a fact, however, in particular in Ireland—that of Sigo—that is steeped in more iniquity than even Beverly or

BRIDGEWATER on the same island, or Harrington during the last legislative session. This is what an Irish exchange says:— 'One man was offered £75 to go away; he afterwards received £20, besides several sovereigns and half sovereigns from one of Knox's friends, but voted for the Liberal candidate. Another witness stated that the Major asked him whether £50 would do. Witness answered in the affirmative, although he did not intend to vote on the Conservative side, he wanted to take all he could get. Another witness remembered the names of six persons who had told him they had got money from the Sergeant—five £25 each, and one £30.
