Heaven knows what fabulous sums the Freach budget would assign to a man who held three such positions. The \$00,000 france now paid each year to functionaries who are not Bismarks would be hought far below the mark. Well, after adding up all the items, we find the Count does not touch one-third of that sum. In the first place, as Chancellor he does not receive

n the first place, as Chancellor he does not receive a farthing, his functions being gratuitous; as Presi-dent of the Prussian Ministry, he gets 12,000 thalers (3 france 75 centimes each), besides 6000 more for ex-penses of representation, together with a residence; as Minister of Lauenburg, he draws 4000 thalers, just the net revenue of that durch. the net revenue of that duchy. But let us set down the whole amount at 33,000 thalers, or say 100,000 frances. Add to this, not to omit anything, the inte-rest of the donation of 400,000 thalers which the Chamber voted in 1865 to the Minister who prepared Sadowa, and you will still fail far short of the sums pocketed every year by the French colleagues of the Count.
