



Her story is soon told. There was a mother who neglected her, an aunt who beat her, a life of shame in the next street, and the door wide open. Josephine Ray, the negro Charon on this roaring river of iniquity, occasion-ally boxed her ears, but she gave her a room, and treated her as she thought a woman should be treated. Youth and inexperience are marketable, and this Josephine Ray very well understood. In the brief career there were many to see and appreciate her charms, and at length-God help us that it should be so-there was one to stir that sinful, misguided soul with the unhallowed joys of maternity. 
