We called upon the Treasurer of the United States, in whose custody they are, to exhibit to us the whose custody they are, to exhibit to us the bonds referred to in your communication, with a schedule of the same classified by their respective issues and denominations. On personal inspection and count we found in the custody of the Treasurer bonds of the United States regis-tered in the name of and payable to the Secretary of the Treasury in trust for the United States, amounting in the aggregate to seventeen millions eight hundred and forty-four thousand and five hundred dollars, designated as belonging to the sinking fund by the words "sinking fund" distinct-ly impressed in red upon the face of each bond. We also found in the custody of the Treasurer other like bonds amounting in the aggregate to forty five million dollars, registered in the name of and payable to the Secretary of the Treasury in trust for the United States, which are the bonds designated as specially purchased. The total amount of the bonds belonging to both classes, examined and counted, is \$62,814,500, and they are of the several issues annexed. After having verified the account of the bonds so held by the Treasurer by personal examina-tion and count of the same, we compared the sche-dules with the records of the issue of the bonds in the loan branch of the Secretary's office, and with those in the office of the Register of the the scheme and found each to array with Treasury, and found each to agree with the others and with our actual count. The words "sinking fund" impressed upon the bonds belonging to that fund are sufficient to distinguish them from the bonds specially purchased; and in our judgment the form in which all the bonds are registered in the name of the Secretary in trust for the United States is sufficient to protect the Government from any lia-bility of loss by their destruction or reissue. Execution of Pike, the Murderer-His Farewell Address-A Warning Against Intempe-

rance. CONCORD, N. H., Nov. 9.-Josiah Little Pike, who murdered Thomas Brown and wife, two aged persons, at Hampton Falls, in May, 1868, was hanged in the jall-yard of this city to-day. On the scaffold he made the following speech:— "I do not shrink from my fate. I do not dread

to die. I know how worthless my life is, and have faith in Christ for a better hereafter, but I wish to leave a warning in my last words, to those who are inclined towards intemperance. It has decided my fate, and ruined my soul. I en-treat those who deal in intoxicating drink to stop that dreadful work, and, oh! I implore their victims to stop before it is too late. As I hope to be forgiven the sins of a misspent life, I forgive all severity and injustice towards myself, and willingly commit my soul, wicked and un-worthy as 1 have been, to a merciful Saviour; and to my friends who have been so kind, and who have given me sympathy and encourage-ment during my stay in this prison, I can only




