The New Central Iowa Railroad. To the people of the Atlantic slope the great West is still almost a terra incognita. We hear almost fabulous stories of the unparalleled mineral and a gricultural wealth of the immense tract of country comprised in what is called the Mississippi valley, but the general ideas about the actual development nt region are extremely vague.

lowa, for example, has an area greater than that of Pennsylvania or New York. More than 35,000,000 acres lie within her boundaries. Her popuation has grown from 192,000 in 1850 to 1,100,000 in 1869. Her production of wheat, corn, and oats has increased from 11,000,000 bushels in 1850 to \$7,000,000 in 1867. And yet but one-ninth of her area (4,317.84) acres out of a total of 35,228,800) has been put under cultivation. This has not been for any natural lack in capacity, for Iowa has so little timber and a so uniformly undulating surface that it is estimated that not one acre in ten is waste land. The soil is a rich, deep mould, of a fertility unsurpassed in the world. What shall stimulate further population and an even more rapid increase of production than has already distinguished the Hawkeye State? The answer is found in the history of every Western State where the bulk of the population is agricultural, and farming has attained a grandeur unknown to farmers of New England or the Middle States.

Give to the rolling prairies of Iowa, as yet untilled, ready access by competing routes to rival markets, and its fifty-five thousand square miles will feed half the world. Five east and west lines, in construction or completed, carry her freights to Chicago; there is not a north and south line in the State to give the producer and the consumer the benefit of a competing market. The want is about to be supplied by the building of the "Central Railroad of Iowa," from the southern to the northern boundary, two hundred and forty miles in length, passing through a tier of counties which have a population of more than 200,000, and which are among the richest in all that rich State, and forming, in connection with the North Missouri road from St. Louis, and the Milwankee and St. Paul from the latter city (both completed and in successful operation), a through line between those two large and growing commercial Western centres, about 150 miles shorter than any existing rallroad line.

This enterprise is in the hands of capitalists who are convinced of its importance, and who will spare so effort to push it to a speedy and successful conclusion. From a mere pecuniary point of view it is considered as absolutely certain that the road will be a great success from the beginning, while its impo.tance as an aid in the development of the great Northwest can scarcely be overestimated.
