FOREIGN AFFAIRS.

The Dalmatian insurrection has not been suppressed yet.
Large reinforcements of volunteers have left Spain for Cuba.
Gales on the English coast have resulted in numerous shipwrecks.
Spanish republicans disclaim any conspiracy with the Cuban revolutionists.
Grand Duchess Olga is asked by the Pope to plead the cause of the Catholics with the Czar of Russia.
Elections for members of the French Corps Legislatif continued on Saturday, and passed off quietly in Paris.
Reductions have been made by the Argentine Republic in the tariff on some of the American imports and exports, to take effect in 1870.
An engagement recently took place on the Upper Brazos between 200 Cavalry and 400 Indians. It lasted two days, and resulted in the flight of the Indians, who left 40 dead and many more wounded. None of the soldiers were killed.
The passage of the Suez Canal has been completed, the inauguration fleet arriving at the Red Sea terminus. No difficulty was experienced in the depth of water, there being fully twenty feet at the shallow parts, being Ismailia and Suez. Steamers drawing fifteen feet can pass through in fifteen hours.
