## The Triple Murder at Huntingdon.

Godfried Bohrer, one of the men arrested for the murder of the Perghtal family, near Hunlingdon, has made a partial confession of the transaction. This is it:—

I was born in Wurtemberg, in May, 1827, and e to this country in 1864; I was never married; I served as a private in Company C, 7th New York Volunteers, for two years and two months; after being discharged from the army I lived first in New York, then in Huntingdon, and latterly at Altoona; I worked in the coal mine on Broad Top a couple of months for Robert Hare Powell; I was never acquainted with the family of John Perghtal, but passed

ere once and asked for work. I first became acquainted with Oliver (Albert) odeaberg at his boarding-house in Altoona, in imber last; we slept together and boarded at the same house; soon after I got acquainted with him, he told me that Perghtal had money; aid that he had slept there twice; he ne to go along and stay outside, and said I need of know what he did inside: we came down n the cars on Monday evening from Altoona, nd walked from Huntingdon by way of McConwn to Perghtal's that evening; and slept als town to Perghtal's that evening, and slep-it night in his (Perghtal's) stable loft; on Tues-lay we walked over the neighborhood and neutred for work, and staid all night in a barn wither down the road; on Wednesday morning came to Huntingdon, and I did not want to o back (this was on the morning of the murder): er (Albert) said if I did not go back he and walked to Perghtal's, but went to the broad Top to avoid getting there too soon; we stopped a while at Connellstown station, and a while at Cleasant Grove; we reached Pergital's about 7 o'clock: I stayed on the railroad and Oliver (Albert) went to the house; I heard

only one shot; the wind was blowing very hard. He was in the house about one hour. He brought out the bags full of gold and silver. He gave me one of them and said, "Now, let's go." I think Oliver (Albert) had about twice as much money as I had. He told me in the lock-up at Altoona that he had put the money away while he was down in the outhouse, by digging a hole

with his hand and burying it. A story was afterwards told by Bodenberg that Bohrer committed the crime while he (Bodenberg) waited on the road, but in all the other details he corroborates Bohrer's confes-
