

John Real.

Although John Real, who killed Officer Smedick, is far gone in consumption, and will probably not live six months, he is taking as much interest in the possibility of being set at liberty as though he were good for twenty years more of pleasurable freedom. He is hardly more than mere skin and bones, and his moral nature seems to have grown as emaciated as his body. His counsel, ex-Judge Stuart, contends that the Supreme Court, which denied Real a new trial, was an invalid tribunal under the provisions of the new State Constitution, which emphatically forbids a judge who has tried a case from taking a part in it upon appeal. Judge Barnard originally tried the case, and hence became disqualified from deciding in it upon appeal. The Supreme Court Room has been crowded to excess during the development of these new phases in the Real case, and will continue to be so until some ultimate decision has been arrived at.
