FROM NEW YORK. The Telegraph Strikers Liveller than Ever.

New York, Jan. S.—An informal meeting of the Telegraphers' League was held this morning at their ball in Grand street. A large number of the fraternity were present, and a great deal of enthusiasm manifested. Despatches were received from all parts of the country, and each one reiterated the determination on part of the operators to stand firm. At Pittsburg, thirty new members have been initiated since the strike. Stirring addresses were made.

NEW-YORHISMS.

NEW YORK, Jan. 8, 1870. "Twelve Little Christians." A correspondent of one of the daily newspapers has just made some astounding discoveries in regard to the way in which various young Christians (let us hope they are not members of the Young Men's Christian Association) pass their Sundays. I don't know whether he appointed himself a vigilance committee of one, but he certainly detected a baker's dozen of Christians last Sunday in rather naughty conduct. Most of these young people-they were all male youngsters-lived at boardinghouses, and, for a change, had cold homilles at church and hot hash at home. One of them went to church and stood on the curbstone when the clock struck twelve, for the purpose of seeing the devout demoiselles come down the steps and display their neat little batteries. Two others read the sporting papers in the morning and went to call upon some young ladies in Greene street in the afternoon. Two more drank any quantity of mixed liquors, and turned into bed at midnight full of bad theology and worse whisky. Other two stayed home all day, wrote letters and slept. I wonder where they reposed most, over their pillows or their writing paper? The rest flirted with young ladies, listened to religious thumping on the boardinghouse piano, read "Tom Burke of Ours," and played dominoes. One only of these wicked men went to church twice on Sunday, but even he acknowledges the corn of having slept in the afternoon. In the face of these appalling facts the newspaper correspondent to whom I have referred asks that free reading rooms be thrown open all Sunday and every Sunday, and that adolescents, Christian or Pagan, male or female, be brought in from the highways and by-ways, and have circulating libraries funnelled into them without money and without price. Those Christians are in a "parlous" way, verily, especially the two that went preaching to the spirits in prison in Greene street, and I recommend

The Heitkamp mystery is still unsolved and unchanged. The body remains in the same condition into which it passed a week ago on Monday night last. The features, the limbs, the joints, the eyes, and the mouth remain precisely in the same condition as heretofore reported. There is nothing new pertaining to the case, except that a scarcely perceptible film gathers over the eyes, which is removed by friends as fast as it gathers, which is very slowly. The pupil of the eye seems as natural as when the body was full of activity. There is no contrac-tion of either the nose or the mouth, no additional coldness, and an absence of all clamminess. The room in which the body has lain since the time noted above has been brought up to an ordinary degree of heat, with two objects—first, to keep the body comfortable if life really does continue, and, second, if life has flown, to see if putrefaction will commence. But up to the hour of 9 o'clock last night there was no perceptible evidences of either animation or putrefaction. There is still no time fixed for the burial, the friends being fully determined to retain the body until the extinction of life is proved between the contraction of a doubt by the present of yond the question of a doubt by the presence of
