PARIS, Feb. 16 .- Seven journals of this city have been officially warned this week. Last evening great crowds of people assembled at a reunion in the Rue St. Martin, Belleville, which was suppressed by the police without disorder. Another prosecution has been commenced against La Marsellaise for violation of the presa law.

FROM WASHINGTON.

Cuban Recognition.
Special Despatch to The Evening Telegraph.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16 .- General Banks offered resolution to-day, authorizing and instructing the President to maintain a strict neutrality between the people of Cuba and the kingdom of Spain so long as the contest now in progress in Cuba shall continue. It also renders inoperative all laws of the United States contrary to that intent of this resolution.

Sale of Cadetships. The Military Committee examined a couple of witnesses from Pennsylvania relative to the sale of cadetships. Their evidence amounts to nothing, as it was entirely of the hearsay order.

Reorganization of the Navy. Despatch to the Associated Press.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16 .- The House Committee on Naval Affairs to-day had under consideration a bill for the reorganization of the navy, and discussed the question of positive and relative rank without coming to a conclusion. Naval Orders.

Lieutenant-Commander George T. Wilde has been ordered to ordnance duty at the Boston Navy Yard, and Ensign Thomas H. Dubois to the Frolic. Lieutenant-Commander F. E. Chadwick has been detached from the Tuscarora and granted sick leave. Ensign Joseph H. Stickney has been detached from the receiving ship Ohio and ordered to the Congress. Second Assistant Engineers Charles H. Greenleaf and James H. Chasmar are detached from the Mohican and placed on waiting orders.

The Navy Complement Fully Reached.

Washington, Feb. 16.—The complement of men for the navy allowed by law, viz., eight thousand five hundred men, having been reached, the department has directed that enlistments shall cease. The effect of this order will be to detain the Colorado, which is destined to relieve the Dalawa to a Dalawa to the Dalawa to which is destined to relieve the Delaware on the Asiatic station, and to keep the men attached to the latter vessel over the term of their enlistment, for which, however, they will receive one-fourth additional pay. The department has urged upon Congress the necessity of allowing an additional number of men to meet this contingency, but no action has been taken 2 and hence the Congress, the Colorado, and other vessels cannot sail. In any emergency that might arise, the department is powerless to sup-ply a single vessel to meet it.

CITY ORDINANCES.

A N ORDINANCE A N ORDINANCE
Por the better regulating of the Conveyance
of Prisoners in the Police Vans, etc.
Section 1. The Select and Common Councils of the
City of Philadelphia do ordain, That the Police
Vans and other vehicles used for the carrying of
prisoners to and from the several prisons shall be so
arranged that the males and females may be

separated therein.

Section 2. That it shall not be lawful for any proprietor, driver, or any other person, to carry prisoners in such vans or vehicles in any manner whereby males and females shall be secured together in any apartment thereof.

Section 3. That it shall not be lawful for the drivers of prison ways. drivers of prison vans, or any other persons, to furnish any spirituous, vinous or mait liquors to any prisoner or prisoners while under charge in such vehicle.

Section 4. Any person violating the provisious of the second section of this ordinance shall be fine-for every such offense the sum of ten dollars, and any person violating the provisions of the third section of this ordinance shall be fined for every such offense the sum of twenty-five dollars, which said penalties shall be sued for as debts of a like amount are by law recoverable.
