## MEWS SUMMARY.

## City Affairs.

-Last evening the hall of the Literary De-partment of the University of Pennsylvania was comfortably filled with ladies and gentlemen to listen to a lecture on Social Science by Professor McIlvaine.

-The City Troop, under the command of Captain Frederick E. Rogers, met at the armory on Twenty-first street at six o'clock last evening and proceeded to a popular restaurant, dismounted, and, in accordance with a time-honored custom of the corps. honored the memory of the illustrious Washington by an elegant dinner.

-Mrs. Armstrong, while walking on Kater street yesterday, was thrown down by a boy who ran sgainst her, and had a hip fractured. She was removed to the residence of her niece, Nineteenth and Kater streets.

-A dwelling on Thirteenth street, below Jefferson, was entered yesterday afternoon and robbed of household goods. A man was afterwards arrested who had forks and spoons on his person, which were identified as the stolen property. He was locked up for a hearing at the Central Station at two hearing o'clock to-day.

-About four o'clock yesterday afternoon the coal-oil works of S. Lord, at Twenty-fifth street and Passyunk road, were destroyed by fire, originating from sparks from a locomo tive. The loss is estimated at \$5000, which is covered by insurances in Wheeling and Baltimore companies.

-The Young Mennerohor celebrated its eighteenth anniversary yesterday. The mem-bers and invited guests partook of a handsome banquet, and speeches were made by a number of gentlemen. Mayor Fox was present.

-At a meeting of the School Directors of the Thirteenth ward, held yesterday, it was resolved that they request the Councilmen of that ward to move a reconsideration of the action recently taken by Select Council on the appropriation for teaching music in the public schools. It is expected that the teachers, at their next meeting on Saturday, will pass resolutions in favor of continuing the instruction of music in the schools.

-In response to a call to voters and taxpayers opposed to the descenation of Inde-pendence Square, twenty-three persons assembled last evening at Market and Merrick streets. Mr. A. R. Paul presided, and stated that this was an adjourned meeting, and although the assemblage was small the movement against Independence Square was controlled by those who were deeply in earnest.

A printed petition, prepared by a committee, urging the Legislature to prevent the desecration of Independence Square, was presented to the meeting for signatures, and the Secretary read resolutions adopted by the Keystone Battery opposing public buildings on Independence Square. A series of resolutions were adopted and the meeting adjourned.

-St. George's M. E. Church, situated on Fourth street, below Vine, presented a novel, imposing, and attractive appearance last evening. The body of the church was graced with the presence of a large number of Ma-senia Knichts Templar in full uniform for sonic Knights Templar, in full uniform, for whose especial behoof divine services were held. The Rev. Dr. Robert H. Pattison, Past Eminent Commander of the Philadelphia Commandery No. 2, and Past Grand Prelate, officiated, and occupying seats on the pulpit were Sir William J. Kelly, Eminent Com-mander of Mary Commandery, Sir Andrew Robeno, Jr., Sir Jeremiah L. Hutchinson, Sir Charles L. Hale, Sir Charles S. Kingston, and others. Rev. Robert H. Pattison, D. D., delivered the sermon on the occasion.

firmness"—on the Bourse at its closing this day. But I shall astonish your countryman as I go on. Will you or they believe—for my own part, I do not think they will—that the people most concerned know nothing that has happened, and seem to me to think of nothing that pos-sibly might happen? I have been all over Paris to-day, and without affectation may say that I have applied for information to every source, from the highest to the lowest, and the concluhave applied for information to every source, from the highest to the lowest, and the conclu-sion at which I have arrived is that we were last evening—that is to say, in the environs of Paris—on the edge of a precipice, and that we escaped from it and got home safe. No two people really agree even as to what they saw with their own eyes; and at least one gnnmaker's shop broken into and plundered was no more broken into than my bedroom. The work did corrainly steel revolvers: bedroom. The mob did certainly steal revolvers; but, as I said yesterday would be the case, they could not find cartridges to fit them—charged cartridges at least. To-night, or not for months, perhaps years, an effort will be made in France to bring about the ruin of order and the destruction of private property and trade. If it is postponed, why then the revolutionists are utterly absurd, as I hope they are, and will so ontinne.

The rioters who went up the Fanbourg assembled in the Rue de l'Orillon, and made there a barricade with the materials brought together for the construction of a church. They held their ground till half-past 1 o'clock. They were then three times summoned to retire, and the barricade was taken by the Garde Municipale. A pistol was fired, and at the second summens a man broke the gun of a quartermaster with a single blow of an iron bar. Another barricade, constructed of night-carts, at the corner of the Rue St. Maur, was taken at the same time, no resistance being made.

A band of five hundred insurgents burst into A band of five hundred insurgents burst into the Place dn Chateau d'Eu, about 10 o'clock, crying out—"A bas les assassins!" "A bas l'Em-pire!" The brawlers were dispersed by the sergents-de-ville. Some two thousand rioters who shouted "Vive la Republique!" "Vive Rochefort!" and also threatened to march to the Marseillaise office, were also dis-persed by the police; and a man who carried a grad day at the head of the troop was arrested red flag at the head of the troop was arrested. About midnight the shop of M. Lefaucheux was sacked. Two hundred revolvers and twelve hundred cartridges were seized. The in-surgents were dislodged by the Garde de Paris. One hundred and thirty-six persons in all have been arrested, many of whom carried revolvers and cartridges. The revolt seems to have been batched in the office of the Marseillaise, the centre of action of the entire movement. The persons arrested are confined in the Conciergerie, and are now undergoing interrogation by the Commissaries de Police. Some of the writers in the Marseillaise were

arrested last night, or rather this morning, on leaving their office; but the paper was sold as usual on the boulevards, fifty centimes being charged for it instead of fifteen. It contains nothing particular, however, except a short account of Rochefort's arrest, and a bold defiaccount of Rochelort's arrest, and a bold deh-ance of the Government. To give you some idea of the suddenness of the movement last night I may mention that, up to midnight, no-body had heard even of the arrest of M. Roche-fort, and the boulevards, from the Porte St. Martin to the Madeleine, wore their usual bright and carcless aspect .- Correspondence London Netes.
