

NEWS SUMMARY.

City Affairs. Mrs. Sarah Ladlee, aged 81 years, died suddenly yesterday at the house of her daughter, No. 210 German street. The coroner held an inquest, and a verdict of death from debility was rendered.

—Brevet Brigadier-General Charles L. Kilburn, Colonel and Assistant Commissary-General of Subsistence, Chief Commissary of the Military Division of the Atlantic, has been assigned to duty in this city.

—A colored man named Richard Demby, from Wilmington, Del., died in the cellar of the Union Street Station yesterday afternoon. The coroner held an inquest, and a verdict of death from exposure was rendered.

—Francis Larue, aged 21 years, residing at Ninth and Catharine streets, was severely cut in the leg by an axe slipping from his hands while chopping wood, on Saturday. He was admitted to the Pennsylvania Hospital.

—Rev. Robert C. Matlack, for a number of years rector of the Church of the Nativity, Eleventh and Mont Vernon streets, preached his farewell sermon yesterday morning, having accepted the position of Secretary of the Evangelical Education Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church.

—A posse of the police visited O'Neill's Hall, at Broad and Lombard streets, on Saturday night, where a dance was going on, and arrested fifty-nine persons, chiefly young men and girls, some of the latter from twelve to fifteen years old. They were taken to the Central Station, and on the oaths of the officers who made the arrest were bound over for their future good behavior.

—The religious ceremonies connected with the dedication of the Temple of the Third New Jerusalem Society of Philadelphia, corner of Paul and Unity streets, Frankford, took place yesterday. The new Temple is of brick, and cost about \$2000. The congregation have purchased the plot of ground at \$6000, and intend to erect thereon, at some future period, a much larger building.

—The anniversary of the Broad Street M. E. Church Missionary Society took place yesterday afternoon, in the church edifice, Broad and Christian streets. The exercises consisted of prayer, singing by the scholars, and addresses by Rev. J. Neill, Rev. George Mearns, Rev. G. Cummings, and Rev. J. C. Lucas. The report of the superintendent showed the membership of the schools to be 300 scholars, and the missionary collections \$625, an increase of \$75 over the previous year.

—A meeting of the Scott Legion was held on last Saturday evening, at their hall, at Sixth and Race streets. The following officers were elected for the ensuing year:—President A. H. Reynolds; Vice-President, T. G. Funston; Recording Secretary, William J. Mackey; Corresponding Secretary, E. B. Biles; Treasurer, George Moore; Trustees, John Spear, J. J. O'Connell, William N. Shultz; Monument Committee, William Kerlin, R. E. Winslow, William Babe.

—One hundred and one persons were admitted yesterday morning to the communion of the Cohocksink Presbyterian Church, Franklin street and Columbia avenue, Rev. Mr. Mutchmore, pastor. Eighty-two of the number were on confession of their faith and nineteen on certificate from other churches.

—Before receiving them as members Mr. Mutchmore addressed the candidates, stating that it would be required of them to refrain from attending theatrical and other popular amusements, or engaging in dancing or card-playing.

—Daniel McCarty, Jane McCarty, G. P. Brown and Charles Allston were before Alderman Kerr on Saturday, they having been arrested on a warrant issued by the Mayor, on the statement of Margaret Brannan. Complainant arrived in this city on Thursday last from Salem, Mass., and being a stranger here accepted the invitation of a man whom she met at the foot of Walnut street to accompany her to a lodging house. She was taken to a house on North Front street, where she saw the defendants, and where her treatment was such as compelled her to leave the house the same night and wander about the streets until she met a policeman, and was provided with lodgings at a station-house. As the testimony did not connect Allston with any impropriety of conduct he was discharged. The others were held for trial.

Domestic Affairs. —Snow closed on Saturday at 1:30. —Snow was nine inches deep in Richmond, Va., yesterday.

—Governor Stevenson has refused to accept Mr. Golladay's resignation.

—There is a growing feeling in Mexico in favor of annexation to the United States.

—Texas will be admitted as soon as her delegation and the necessary papers arrive.

—Zamorá, the assassin of Greenwaldt, has been convicted and executed in Havana.

—Numerous applications are being made for the work in the navy yards, but there are no vacancies.

—A man was knocked down on Thirty-fourth street, New York, on Saturday night, and robbed of \$12,000.

—Two children were fatally burned at Wethersville, Me., on Friday evening, by the explosion of a coal oil lamp.

—Only Justices Miller and Strong, it is said, are in favor of pronouncing all the Reconstruction laws constitutional.

—President Grant on Saturday visited the Government Printing Office, and met with a most enthusiastic reception from the employees.

—Evidence has been taken by the committee exonerating Mr. Covode from any corruption in connection with cadetship appointments.

—Rulope and Deery played a game at billiards in San Francisco on Saturday night, for the championship of America. The former won the victory.

—The amount deposited in the Treasury by the national banks as security for public deposits, which last year was \$33,500,000, is now but between \$17,000,000 and \$18,000,000.

—Actual hostilities have commenced in the Red River Territory, and resulted in a victory for the Union.

—The recent riot among the emigrants on Ward's Island would appear to have resulted from the gross mismanagement of the depot. Among other matters of complaint it seems that only four washbasins and two towels, changed twice a week, were allowed for 600 persons.

—A New York paper published yesterday an absurd story to the effect that Napoleon died six months since; that the Prince Imperial is reigning as Napoleon IV; that Napoleon is represented by a man bearing a wonderful resemblance to him; and lastly, that the fraud is countenanced by England and Russia.

Foreign Affairs. —Carlists continue active in Spain. —Navigation of the Baltic will soon be resumed.

—Another Atlantic cable is spoken of in England. —All monopoly in ocean cables is abolished in France. —Turkey no longer collects tolls from ships on the Bosphorus. —A cardinal's hat, it is said, has been promised to the Primate of Poland. —Belgium has ratified a treaty reducing the postal rates to the United States by one-half. —Another batch of Paris journalists have been prosecuted, convicted of course, and sentenced to imprisonment and fine.

Applause, Calls, and Euciores.
