Olty Affairs.

-Mrs. Sarah Lidlee, aged 84 years, died suddenly yesterday at the house of her daugh-ter, No. 210 German street. The Coroner held an inquest, and a verdict of death from debility was rendered.

-Brevet Brigadier-General Charles L. Kilburn, Colonel and Assistant Commissary-General of Subsistence, Chief Commissary of the Military Division of the Atlantic, has been

assigned to duty in this city. —A colored man named Richard Demby, from Wilmington, Del., died in the cellar of the Union Street Station yesterday afternoon. The Coronor held an inquest and a verdict of death from exposure was rendered.

-Francis Larue, aged 21 years, residing at Ninth and Catharine streets, was severely cut in the leg by an axe slipping from his hands while chopping wood, on Saturday. He was admitted to the Pennsylvania Hospital.

-Rev. Robert C. Matlack, for a number of years rector of the Church of the Nativity, Eleventh and Mount Vernon streets, preached his farewell sermon yesterday morning, having accepted the position of Secretary of the Evangelical Education Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church.

-A posse of the police visited O'Neill's Hall, at Broad and Lombard streets, on Saturday night, where a dance was going on, and arrested fifty-nine persons, chiefly young men and girls, some of the latter from twelve to fifteen years old. They were taken to the Central Station, and on the oaths of the officers who made the arrest were bound over for their future good behavior.

-The religious ceremonies connected with the dedication of the Temple of the Third New Jerusalem Society of Philadelphia, corner of Paul and Unity streets, Frankford, took place yesterday. The new Temple is of brick, and cost about \$2000. The congregation have purchased the plot of ground at \$6000, and intend to erect thereon, at some future period, a much larger building. —The anniversary of the Broad Street M.

E. Church Missionary Society took place yes-terday afternoon, in the church edifice, Broad and Christian streets. The exercises consisted of prayer, singing by the scholars, and addresses by Rev. J. Neill, Rev. George Mears, Rev. G. Cummings, and Rev. J. C. Lucas. The report of the superintendent showed the membership of the schools to be 300 scholars, and the missionary collections \$625, an increase of \$75 over the previous year.

Applause, Calls, and Encores.

"Players, after all," averred Hazlitt, "have little reason to complain of their hard-earned, short-lived popularity. One thunder of ap-plause from pit, boxes, and gallery is equal to a whole immortality of posthumous fame." Nevertheless, the transitory nature of an actor's rewards has oftentimes stirred regret and commiseration. Shakespeare, as we all know, makes sympathetic mention of the poor player,

"That struts and frets his hour upon the stage, And then is heard no more."

Garrick, in his prologue to the Clandestine Marriage, states feelingly :--

"The painter dead, yet still he charms the eye, While England lives his fame can never die; But he who struts his hour upon the stage, Can scarce extend his fame for half an age; Nor pen nor pencil can the actor save— The art and artist share one common grave."

Cibber, in his "Apology," laments mellifluously that the momentary beauties flowing from an harmonious elocution cannot, like those of poetry, be their own record; that the animated graces of the actor can live no longer than the instant breath and motion that present them; or, at least, can but faintly glimmer through the memory, or imperfect attestation of a few surviving spectators." And Haz-litt, himself, notwithstanding his dictum on the subject above set forth, has placed on record certain expressions of tenderness for the player's evanescent glory. "When an author dies it is no matter, for his works remain. When a great actor dies, there is a void produced in society, a gap which requires to be filled up. The literary amateur may find employment for his time in reading old authors only, and exhaust his entire spleen in scouting new ones; but the lover of the stage cannot amuse himself in his solitary fastidiousness by sitting to witness a play got up by the departed ghosts of first-rate actors; or be contented with the perusal of a collection of old playbills; he may extol Garrick, but he must go to see Kean, and, in his own defense, must admire, or at least tolerate, what he sees, or stay away against his will." Hazlitt, it may be noted, was evidently writing under the impression that at no time would the stage be left without the support of players of the Garrick or the Kean class. If he had survived until our present year of grace, it would have become a question with him how far he could admire or tolerate the condition of the modern stage; he might even be driven to accept the alternative he himself suggests, and stay away from our theatres altogether, only with his will rather than against it, in common with a very considerable section of society.

An actor, in regard to the honor of his profession, considered apart from its commercial results, occupies the position of one who has invested his whole fortune in the purchase of an annuity terminating at his decease, and who has become entitled, therefore, to a larger income than accrues to the man able to lay up treasure, and to provide for and bequeath property to posterity. The player can be re-warded only by the applause afforded him during the continuance of his theatrical career, and it is right, therefore, that such applause should fully correspond with and


