## "Hamlet" and Fechter.

A correspondent sends u+ the following criticism on Mr. Fechter's personation of "Hamlet:" In the very first year of the seventeenth century a drama was written in London. The author was a stage manager and proprietor, full of work, an emidiama was written in London. The author was a stage manager and proprietor, full of work, an eminently successful and practical man, who had built himself a fortune by his own labor. With the reputation of being a ruined reprobate, he had run away from home to escape imprisonment before he was twenty, to commence life as call-boy at a theatre; at tweaty-five he was ashareholder in the same theatre, and an author of repute on the road to fortune; at thirty-three he purchased a handsome house; and at forty retired from active life to enjoy an existence of elegant ease with the fame of being a capital business man, as well as the author of about forty of the beat acting dramas of his time. This is, in brief, the history of Shakespeare, and yet by some strange freak one of his most successful tragedies has been separated from the rest, to serve as a mere intellectual problem. Handet is read line by line, and scanned syllable by syllable, until every word becomes a text so preginant with meaning that it is in danger of meaning nothing at all, and the hero must lose all individuality in order to become a problem in metaphysics. In fact, the play was written by an active manager of a theatre, to suit the demands of his audience, and in the steady pursuit of so practical an aim, a great and good man wrote a glorious drama, just as a plain printer in after times undertook a "model letter-writer" which turned into the first novel, and an antiquary putting his informatioa into a marketable shape found it grow into the Waverlex Novels.

# Her Safe Arrival at New York-Cause of the Delay. New York, March 11. - The missing steamer

Smidt, which arrived to-day in forty-eight days from Bremen, reports having been obliged to make the passage south of Ber-muda, in consequence of the engine breaking, which took twelve days to repair. She had a succession of hurricanes for the first twenty days, and since had light winds and fair weather. When the machinery was re-paired she could only be run at half speed,

nd hence the delay in the voyage. The Smidt, of which Thiele, Motz & Co. are agents, left Bremen on the 22d of January. There is no end of conjectures as to the fate of the City of Boston, the other "missing" steamer. There is a strong hope now that she may have put into the Azores. With these islands, it must be borne in mind, communication is unfrequent and uncertain, and days may yet elapse before an arrival from that quarter is reported. On the other hand, however, the numerous reports of vessels passing over the trail of the missing steamer, as to the vast quantities of ice encountered, are anything but reassuring. The Bremen steamer New York, hence, at Southampton yesterday, reports passing many icebergs some of them of "mountainous size," Sail ing vessels at this port, coming from Europe, make like reports almost every day. Still, as the Smidt has come into port safe and sound, why should not the City of Boston ?

The Smidt is a slow boat, and is intended expressly for the carriage of freight and emigrants. She burns but fourteen tons of coal a day against sixty or seventy tons consumed by the mail steamers.

The most rapid progress hitherto made by her in smooth water has been ten knots. Her average speed is about six knots in good weather. She was built for twenty-day passages. Her longest passage from Europe previous to the present was thirty days, and her longest from here twenty-four days.

Hownlet is an admirable acting play; if it is also something more, let it be carefully studied as an entirety, but not so treated that it is debased into a mere public reading lession, over which actor and audience alike bewilder their brains. Now, Mr. Feehter may not be the "Hamlet," or even a good "Hamlet," but at one dash he destroys this old-established system of rendition. He treats the tragedy as if it was a new drama written but yesterday, and as if no one had ever studied it before —as if he had purchased it for himself, and had bought the undisputed right to read it according to his own understanding. Never for one moment does the auditor stop to wonder which of the eight readings of "there are more things in heaven and earth," etc., the artist will choose, or what he will do with "to be or not to be."

will choose, or what he will do with "to be or not to be." The standard stage student, who doubts every-thing and then doubts his doubts, never appears; there is not even a glimpse of his note book. Mr. Fechter has imagined the hero to be a poetic youth, averse to action, yet urged to it against his will. The artist, in his mind's eye, sees a man mirrored. This man may not be Shakespeare's "Hamlet;" he certainly is not the conventional "Ham-let," but he is a man consistent in every thought and deed, and no mere bundle of aphorisms. The actor has thought his way straight through all the perpiexities; he be-heves that the play has one simple, obvious mean-ing, and, strangely enough, the words, obedient to his power, do mean upon his tongue just what he in-tends them to. Although not quite ready to accept his version of the play, yet while under his personal influence and presence the auditor feels as if by some magic chance he had been permitted to see the "original" text unblemished with marginal references and unconfused by foot notes, and the memory afterwards does not rest admiringly upon "points," but recalls a harmonious and effective whole.
