Carlotta Pattl has been feeling her way softly and slowly toward appearing in opera. She is to be assisted by Hermanns, Habelmann, Wilhelm Formes, and Pauline Canissa. Her success in this city has been extraordinary. At the Saturday matinee the supplementary hall was thrown open in addition to the large one, and both were filled with ladies.
