

#### Women at the Clinics.

The annual meeting of the Pennsylvania Hospital was held yesterday afternoon at the hospital building. Mr. John Welsh occupied the chair, and Mr. Saunders Lewis was chosen secretary.

The president's report was read, appealing to the contributors to continue subscribing. The subject of admitting females to the clinics was dwelt on at some length.

The treasurer's report exhibits \$18,233.17 in the Pennsylvania Company for the Insurance on Lives. The steward reported expenses at \$58,889 94, and receipts, \$81,413 20. The number of surgical cases treated were 1282; cured, 810; relieved, 451; by friends, 102; cases of misconduct, 10; eloped, 14; re-maining, 101. Medical cases, 645; cured, 338; relieved, 126; by friends, 54; misconduct, 6; eloped, 11; died, 51; remaining, 59. In the insane department during the past year 117 male patients were admitted; 114 discharged; 42 cured; 5 much improved; 27 improved; 24 stationary; 16 died; now remaining, 166. In the female department 94 were admitted; 103 discharged; 51 cured; 15 much improved; 18 improved; 9 stationary; 10 died; now in hospital, 165.

Mr. Welsh offered the following resolution, which, after a long debate, was agreed to:-Whereas, The managers of the Pennsylvania Hos-pital have asked the contributors to inform the incoming board of their wishes in regard to clinical instruction to women; and whereas such instruction when given to large bodies of men and women col-lectively is at present. in the minds of many, of

questionable expediency; therefore Resolved, That the managers, after conferring with their medical and surgical staff, shall, if practicable, arrange for appropriate and thorough clinical in-struction in the Pennsylvania Hospital to the siu-dents of the Women's Medical College of this city.

## NOTICE TO MARINERS.

A special examination recently made develops changes among the shoals in the vicinity of Monochanges among the shoals in the vicinity of Mono-moy (southerly point of Chatham, Cape Cod), since my last survey, of 1853, the most important of which, to mariners, are as follows:—A dangerous shoal, having but 10 feet of water upon it, a short distance SE, from the spar buoy on northwestern broken part of Polleck Rip. This shoal bears from Pollock Rip Lightship N. ½ E., distant 1½ nautical miles, nearly. The northern sine across the Pollock Rip has become very narrow, and vessels of more than 10 feet draft passing through it should proceed with caution, especially with light winds, as the current sets rapidly across the above danger. Between the two buoys, upon the northern part of Stone Horse, not less than 18 feet was found, where there was but 12 feet in 1853. I, however, detected a small spot of 15 feet, bearing NE by E., distant

a small spot of 16 feet, bearing NE by E., distant & mile from the southern buoy upon the Stone Horse.


The greatest depth of water found within the main The greatest depth of water found within the main ship channel across the Pollock Rip, was 24 feet, where there was but 21 feet in 1823. The main and broken part of Pollock Rip has ex-tended seaward during the last seventeen years about 1-5 of a nautical mile. Monomory Point has also extended southwesterly in the same ratio.
