GEORGIA.

The Bill for the Reconstruction and Admission of the State.

The House Reconstruction Committee met yesterday and agreed upon the bill for the admission of Georgia. The proposition offered by General Butler at the previous meeting was adopted, and he was directed to report the bill to the House. It is the bill originally reported by the committee, with a single amendment. As the bill has been so much changed since it was at first reported, we append it as now agreed upon by the com-

Whereas, The people of Georgia have framed and adopted a Constitution of State government which is republican; and whereas, the Legislature of Georgia, elected under said Constitution, has ratified the fourteenth and fifteenth amendments to the Constitution of the United States; and whereas, the performance of these several sets in good faith is a conformance of these several acts in good faith is a con-dition precedent to the representation of the State

in Congress; therefore,
Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the said State of Georgia is entitled to representation in the Congress of the United States; provided, that before any member of the Legislature of said State shall take or resume do. blemnly swear (or aftirm) that I have never taken an bath, as a member of Congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as an member of any State Legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any State, to support the Constitution of the United States, and afterwards engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. So help me God," Or under the pains and penalties of perjury (as the case may be). Or such person shall, in like manner, take, subscribe, and file the following oath or affirmation:—'I, ————, do solemnly swear (or affirmation:—'I, ———, do solemnly swear (or affirmation:—'I, ——, do solemnly swear (or affirmation:—'I, ——, do solemnly swear (or affirmation:—'I, ——, do solemnly

affirmations, with proof of the signature of the party accused, shall be taken and held as conclusive evidence that such oath or affirmation was regularly and lawfully administered by competent authority: and lawfully administered by competent authority; and provided further, that every such person who shall neglect for a period of thirty days next after the passage of this act to take, subscribe, and file such oath or affirmation as aforesaid, shall be deemed and taken to all intents and purposes to have vacated his office; and provided further, that the State of Georgia is admitted to representation in Congress as one of the States of the Union, upon the following fundamental conditions:—First, That the Constitution of Georgia shall never be so amended or changed as to deprive any citizen or class Constitution of Georgia shall never be so amended or changed as to deprive any citizen or class of citizens of the United States of the right to vote who are entitled to vote by the Constitution as herein recognized, except as a punishment for such crimes as are now felonies at common law. whereof they shall have been duly convicted under laws equally applicable to all the inhabitants of said State; provided, that any alteration of said Constitution, prospective in any alteration of said Constitution, prospective in its effects, may be made in regard to the time and place of residence of voters. Second. That it shall never be lawful for the said State to deprive any citizen of the United States, on account of his race, or, or previous condition of servitude, of the righ hold office under the Constitution and laws o said State, or upon any such ground to require of him any other qualifications for office than such as are required of all other citizens. Third. That the Constitution of Georgia shall never be so amended or changed as to deprive any citizen or class of citior changed as to deprive any citizen or class of citizens of the United States of the school rights and privileges secured by the Constitution of said State. Section 2. And be it further enacted, That so much of the act entitled "An act making appropriations for the support of the army for the year ending June 30, 1868, and for other purposes," approved March 2, 1867, as prohibits the organization, arming, or calling into service of the militia forces in the States of Georgia, Mississippi, Texas, and Virginia, be and the same is hereby repealed


