CAMERON'S RESPONSE.

Mingruder's Letter Wakes Up the Sage of Middletown—A Square Issue Joined. While Senator Cameron studiously avoids a direct personal explanation or contradiction of any of the assertions made in the letter of the ex-Confederate General Magruder, published by us on Saturday last, he evidently is not content to permit these assertions to go unanswered. Consequently we find in the special Washington despatches of the Press this morning a paragraph which bears internal evidence of having been inspired by the Senator himself. In pursuance of our custom of giving both sides of every issue in which the people at large are interested, we quote the paragraph referred to in full, as follows:-

The letter of J. Bankhead Magruder, which ap-The letter of J. Bankhead Magruder, which appeared in one of your afternoon contemporaries the other day relative to Senator Cameron, is, I am authorized to say, I alse in all its statements. When General Cameron came into the War Odice upon the accession of Mr. Lincoln to the Presidency, his attention was first called to Magruder by General Franklin, who advised the Secretary of War that Magruder was a "man who would bear watching." Cameron knew little or nothing about him, but he mentioned the circumstance of General Franklin's suspicions to the President. In a short time these suspicions the President. In a short time these suspicions proved correct, for Magruder deserted to the enemy. At that time Mr. Lancoln was opposed to making arrests, except where it seemed to be absolutely necessary, otherwise Magruder would, perhaps, not have had the opportunity to desert the flag, or at least to give his services to the Confederacy. With regard to Senator Cameron offering to send Magrader to Russia, it is sufficient to state that whatever was said on that subject occurred a year before the was said on that subject occurred a year before the Rebellion. As Secretary of War, General Cameron of course had nothing to do with appointing persons to positions abroad. These efforts of the personal enemies of General Cameron to employ the services of Jefferson Davis and other leading rebels to traduce his character, while they only serve to elevate him in the opinion and respect of all loval men, will naturally redound to the injury of those engaged in the disreputable business.



FROM EUROPE.

Bullion in the Bank of Rugland. LONDON, May 26 .- The political news to-day is unimportant. The bullion on hand in the Bank of England has increased heavily since last report. Returns to-day show £402,000 sterling more in the vaults than on last Thursday.

Rie de Janeiro Advices. Later advices have been received from Rio de Janeiro to-day. The Emperor of Brazil had opened the sessions of the Chambers with a speech, as usual. The expected reference to the emancipation of the slaves was omitted, to the surprise of everybody.

Berlin, May 26.-King William formally closed the sessions of the Reichstadt to-day. In his speech he enumerates the bills passed during the first session of that body. He anticipated the happiest results from these laws. which would go a long way towards assuring foreign people that the confederacy develops the national strength, and is a powerful agent for its preservation.

FROM WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, May 26 .- The House, after calling the yeas and navs for four hours, finally passed the Northern Pacific Rallroad bill just as it came from the Senate, by a vote of 107 yeas to 85 nays. The Fifteenth Amendment.

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
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
