THE ASSEMBLY.

Yesterday Afternoon's Session.

The Assembly met at the usual hour yesterday afternoon. The discussion on the ques-tion of an immediate election for members of the Board of Foreign Missions was continued from the morning session. After the discussion, participated in by Elders William Rankin and Governor Pollock, the latter's motion was lost.

Dr. W. M. Paxton, of New York, then read the report of the Standing Committee on Domestic Missions. They report a balance on hand of \$65,037.59, and leave to the decision of the Assembly the question of the location of the new board. They also recommend a liberal sustentation of the missionaries in the employ of the board. A lengthy and somewhat acrimonious debate between Dr. Paxton and Dr. Musgrave then ensued.

The report was then proceeded with, the resolutions attached thereto being taken up scriatim. President McCosh, in the course of the debate, made an earnest appeal in behalf of the increased compensation for ministers of the Church, and submitted a resolution looking to that end by the collection of statistics setting forth the present inadequacy of ministerial remuneration, which was referred to the Special Committee on Sustenation Fund. Adjourned.

SAULT STE. MARIE.

Largest in the World Except Suez-General Cooke Commandant.

A correspondent in the Toronto Globe says: The Sault is, I think, the largest one in the world, except the Suez. The locks hold three large vessels and a tng, and they can be got through in less than an hour. A large number of vessels have passed since I have been here, the tug taking them up to Whisky Bay and down to the lake, respectively. The master, Mr. Carleton, has held his office some years.

A military force is stationed here, consisting of about one hundred men. The barracks are two-story buildings, painted white, and have a very pretty effect. On the grass n ound in front are four cannon, and a sentry can be seen walking up and down. It is here that General Cook, commandant of the district, is now stopping. Several wharves in different stages of decay lie in front of the warehouses, and some miserable sheds, surrounded by half-breeds and negroes, line the shore.

On the Canadian side the houses are not so numerous: but there is an excellent wharf. which at the present moment is a scene of considerable activity. There are some admirable buildings in the village, which is the leading place in the district of Algoma. Mr. Simpson has a fine house, looking on the river, and the court-house, jail, customhouse, etc., are all handsome structures, built of stone. The country lying at the back is poorly settled, but is good land. It is covered with thick undergrowth, and along the shore, for half a mile inland, are large boulders of various stones, granite, gneiss, etc., showing that the place must have been under water at one time. ST. CHRISTOPHER COLUMBUS.

The Proposed Canonization of the Discoverer of America.

The Paris Monde publishes the following:—

The Italian journal, the Stendardo Cattolica, at Genoa, states that fresh steps are being taken at Rome to get the canonization of Christopher Columbus agreed to. It may be remembered that, so far back as 1865, two laymen in France and Italy simultaneously, though not in concert, addressed the same demand to the Holy See. In the following year, the Cardinal Archbishop of Bordeaux, Mgr. Donnet, in whose metropolitan jurisdiction are found the French Antilles, prayed the Pope to lend a favorable ear to the above petitions. Spain, in its turn, took the matter up, and the Cardinal Archbishop of Burgos fully joined in the prayer of his French colleague. It has been objected that this subject could not be introduced without violating the rules wisely laid down by Pope Benedict XIV. But this exception—which would be necessarily unique in the history of the Church, since there are no more new worlds to discover and subject to the Gospel-seems justified by the noble character of the man for whom the honor of being placed upon Catholic altars is solicited. It is certain, too, that Christopher Columbus possessed, in an eminent degree, all the Christian virtues. Bottero, who was secretary to St. Carlo Borromeo, gathered, during his two visits to Spain, some very important evidence as to his temperance, modesty, love of prayer, and his horror of all that is dishonorable in the sight
