NEWS SUMMARY.

City Affairs. -- A large number of the dry goods com-mission merchants of this city have agreed to close their stores on and after to-day at 4 o'clock and on Saturday at 3 o'clock P. M., until September 1, 1870.

-Yesterday afternoon the Vigilant Steam Engine made a trial at half-past 3 o'clock, at Broad and Fitzwater streets. According to the statements of some of the members of the company, a stream of water was run through a 1g-inch nozzle the distance of 251 feet, while according to the measurement of others the distance was only 235 feet. After playing for thirty minutes the piston-rod broke, and all further experiments ceased for the time.

-At a joint meeting of the Board of Health and Guardians of the Poor yesterday the following was referred to the Committee on Hospital of the Almshouse, to report at a subsequent meeting:-

Whereas, The increase and spread of the relapsing fever cases into different parts of our city, to an ex-tent beyond the present means of the Board of Health to accommodate, and as said Board of Health have appealed to us for assistance, there-Health fore

fore Resolved, That we do not regard the Philadelphia Hospital of the Almshouse as the proper place for contagious or infectious diseases to be received; yet we most cheerfully waive any technical objec-tions in the present case, and tender the use of the Small-pox Hospital buildings, outside the walls of the Almshouse, for the temporary use of such fever or other patients as the Board of Health cannot ac-commodate elsewhere.

-The National Executive Committee of the Union League met in Washington yesterday.

-Some amendments to the San Domingo treaty were sent to the Senate yesterday by the President.

-Certificates have been awarded the candidates on the Conservative ticket in the Richmond election. The election will be contested.

-Virginia City, Nevada, is experiencing quite wintry weather. On Saturday three inches of snow fell, and yesterday it was freezing.

-The Rhode Island Legislature met yesterday. At the Republican caucus H. B. Anthony was nominated for re-election to the United States Senate.

-The reciprocity treaty with the Sandwich Islands was considered by the Senate in Executive session yesterday. Its defeat is considered almost certain.

-Twelve prisoners broke out of the jail at Wheeling, W. Va., yesterday, effecting their escape in a singularly impudent manner. Four were recaptured.

-Two brothers were murdered and three other members of the family badly wounded in the western portion of Cumberland county, N. C , by three unknown ruffians, on Wednesday morning last.

-In the United States Senate yesterday afternoon, after the close of our report, the bill to supply deficiencies in pay and mileage of Representatives, etc., was passed. The bill for the relief of Rollin White was passed over the President's veto-yeas, 41; nays, 13. A bill relating to land grants to the Southern Pacific Railroad of California was passed, an

The Speaker appointed Messrs. Logan, Schenck, and Slocum the committee to visit West Point.

THE ASSEMBLY.

(1901 Yesterday Atternoon's Session.

The Assembly met yesterday afternoon at the usual hour. Dr. Howard Crosby moved that a committee of five be appointed to ascertain what movements had been made by the churches towards the setting apart of manses for the clergymen of the Church, and that the presbyteries be instructed to furnish all necessary information to such committee, which was agreed to.

On motion of George Junkin, Esq., of Philadelphia, the report of the Committee on Finance, already published, was taken up and explained at length by Rev. John Hall, D.D., of New York, who especially advocated the plan of regular weekly contributions from each member of the Presbyterian Church, and the recommendations of the committee respecting the five million fund ordered to be raised at the meeting of the Assembly at Pittsburg.

Hon. W. E. Dodge, Treasurer of the Fi nance Committee, also spoke in advocacy of the committee's report, giving interesting details of the sums, both large and small, received by him from different sources, and expressing his entire confidence in the raising of the whole amount of five million dollars.

Hon. William Strong believed that all the causes of benevolence would be strengthened by the most energetic efforts in behalf of this fund, and trusted that all the clergy of the Church would present most strongly to their people the importance of sustaining by their contributions the plan adopted at Pittsburg. He pictured the sufferings necessarily endured by the families of poor ministers in the absence of a sustentation fund, and appealed for liberal contributions to remedy such distresses.

Dr. W. P. Breed moved to refer the resolution providing for a treasury board of twenty business men to have charge of all funds to a special committee, pending the discussion of which the Assembly adjourned.


