# NEWS SUMMARY.

City Affairs.

-The decoration of the soldiers' graves of the Revolutionary war and the Mexican war, and also of the late Rebellion, will take place on Sunday afternoon, at 4 o'clock, at the Franklin Cemetery.

-The annual session of the Worthy Grand Lodge of the A. P. A. will commence at 9 o'clock on Monday morning.

-Last evening an Italian named Battista Rosenza, it is alleged, stabbed William Dunn, residing at the northeast corner of Front and Washington streets, in the side, with a pen-knife, producing a severe wound. The affair grew out of a quarrel between the parties while at work on a school-house in Third street, near Lombard. Battista Moscha, another workman, it is alleged, struck Dunn on the head with a sledge-hammer. The accused were all locked up in the Third District Station House for a hearing to-day.

-A large meeting of the members of the Knights of St. Crispin was held last evening at their hall, Seventh street, below Chesnut. Reports were read showing that several of the hands were unemployed owing to a dull-ness of the trade, while others were out of employment in consequence of an attempt having been made by a city firm to reduce their wages. The married meu who are out of employment owing to the attempted reduction of their wages receive \$10 per week from the society, while the single men receive about \$6. The society is now one of the largest trade societies in the United States.

#### Domestic Affairs. -Gold closed yesterday at 114].

-The abolition of the tax on gross receipts is to be considered to-day by the House.

-Spencer Wright was hanged at Estville, Va., yesterday, for a murder committed in

April, 1868. -A new Funding bill will be presented to the House on Monday next, by the Ways and Means Committee.

-The total losses of the Fenians during the late raid are now stated at eleven killed and seventeen wounded, three mortally.

-Reports from the Red River, as to Riehl's intentions, are contradictory. One despatch says that he is dissatisfied with the Manitoba bill and will resist; another, that he is robbing the mails to obtain funds for a flight to the United States.

-The National Sangerfest will begin at Cincinnati on Wednesday, June 15.

-There has been a severe storm on the Northern Pacific coast. Several vessels are reported wrecked and lives lost.

-William A. Summers, of Boston, has been appointed Supervisor of Internal Revenue for Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticnt. Walcott Hamlin, lately appointed Supervisor, has been assigned to Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont.

-A despatch from Wilmington, North Carolina, says the Republican County Convention, which closed its session there on Thursday evening, nominated a colored man for State Senator, three colored men for the Assembly, and a colored Sheriff. The many colored candidates nominated has caused dissatisfaction among the whites, and a split is expected.

-In the United States Senate yesterday, after the close of our report, on motion of Mr. Sumner, the President was requested to communicate information, if he has any, regarding the reported persecution of Israelites in Roumania. Pending the consideration of the Indian Appropriation bill,

Item-I give and bequeath to Annie Flowers and Emma Flowers the sum of \$200 each.

Item-I give and bequeath to Margaret Musgrave and Mary Smith, widows, the sum of \$200 each.

Item-I give and bequeath to Sarah Searls the sum of \$200.

Item-I give and bequeath to the trustees of the Attleborough M. E. Church \$4000 in Philadelphia and Reading Railroad bonds, the interest to be used-one-third for necessary repairs to the church and fences around the burial ground, and to keep his family burial lot in good order, and the balance for the support of the minister.

the Senate adjourned.

In the House the discussion of the Tax bill was continued, the income clause being under consideration. Amendments were adopted limiting the allowance for house rent to \$500, adding to the exemptions losses by floods, and prohibiting the publication of returns. Mr. Beck's amendment requiring the tax to be deducted from United States bonds was rejected. On reaching the last section of the bill the House adjourned.

#### THE ASSEMBLY.

## Yesterday Atternoon's Session.

The Assembly met yesterday afternoon at the usual hour. The first business being the election of professors, directors, and trustees of the various institutions under the control of the Church, the present incumbents were re-elected.

The report of the Publication Committee was then resumed, Dr. C. C. Beatty, Hon. William Strong, and Hon, W. E. Dodge discussing the report until the hour of adjournment.

Evening Session .- It was ordered that Hon. W. E. Dodge and James Brown, Esq., of New York, be added to the committee already appointed to visit the churches of Great Britain, Ireland, and Scotland.

Rev. M. Chapman introduced a resolution declining, on behalf of the General Assembly, to assume charge of Highland University, which was agreed to.

Rev. Dr. Patterson, of Chicago, presented certain communications from the Free Church of Scotland illustrating the Sustentation Fund of that Church. The documents were referred to the Committee on Sustentation Fund.

The consideration of the report of the Committee on Publications was resumed and discussed, the particular matter in dispute being the authorization of the raising of \$100,000 for the Publication Committee, such amount to be included in the \$5,000,000 Memorial Fund. The section was so amended as to apply the amount to all Presbyterian interests, and the report was adopted.

Dr. William Adams moved that the Assembly adjourn sine die to-morrow at 121 o'elock, which was agreed to.

Dr. Howard Crosby then read the reports on church erection and extension, already published, which were adopted.

The report of the Committee on the Heidelburg Catechism was agreed to. The Assembly then adjourned.

An Important|Will-Value of Estate \$1,000,000 Extracts of the will of the late Amos Phillips have appeared in the daily papers. The following is the document in full --

The will of the above-named gentleman was admitted to probate on Tuesday. It shows that while he was not unmindful of the church with which he had been for many years connected, and charitable organizations connacted with it, he made most ample provision for those of his household who survived him.

The following contains all the bequests, public and private, those portions only being

of the Lehigh Navigation Company, the interest to be applied as partial support of the necessitous cases of the superannuated and worn-out preachers of said Church, and the aged widows of such as have served for twenty years and upwards, and are dependent. Item-I give and bequeath to the Old Men's Home of the city of Philadelphia one \$1000 bond of the Philadelphia and Reading Railroad, the interest to be applied to the support of the institution, unless the principal is needed to put up a new building, and then to be so applied.

Item-I give and bequeath to my cousin, Rachel Manderson, the interest of \$1000 during all the term of her natural life. Item-I give and bequeath to Sarah McEl-

rath the sum of \$500. Item-I give and bequeath to Jacob Cunings, my clerk, the sum of \$200.

Item-All the residue of my estate, real, personal, and mixed, of whatever kind or wherever situated, I give to my son Charles Phillips and the children of J. D. Phillips, share and share alike, the children to receive their father's share as though he were living.

Item-I direct that Atwood Grace (attorney-at-law) shall be the legal adviser of my executors and trustees; and in case of any difficulty, the matter shall be submitted by my counsel and executors to F. Carroll Brewster, whose decision shall be final and binding upon all parties interested.

And lastly, I nominate my son Charles D. Phillips and Theodore Kitchen to be my executors of this my last will and testament, and hereby revoke all other wills and testaments by me at any time heretofore made.

In witness whereof, etc. The will is dated on the 30th of April, 1869, and is witnessed by J. Plankington and Joshua Wright. The estate of Mr. Phillips is estimated to be worth a million of dollars, though some persons make it much higher than that.
