City Affairs. -A mass meeting of workmen under the anspices of the American Central Workingmen's Union was held on Saturnay night in Mechanics' Hall, on Third street, below

-The corner stone of the new St. George's P. E. church, at Sixty-sixth and Hazel avenue, was laid on Saturday afternoon. Right Rev. Bishop Stevens performed the ceremony, assisted by Rev. D. Maison, the parson.

-Company A, Frishmuth's Cavalry, made a street parade yesterday, and proceeded to Frankford Cemetery, and strewed with flowers the graves of soldiers there buried that had not previously been decorated.

-Yesterday afternoon E. D. Baker Post, No. 8, G. A. R., visited Glenwood Cemetery and decorated the graves of about five hundred fallen soldiers. The ceremonies were of an impressive character.

-Early yesterday morning the bakery of Mr. Thomas, No. 707 South Eleventh street. was entered through the basement by a burglar, who worked his way into the upper story, where he succeeded in pulling the fireproof from its place into the yard, where he blew the door open with powder. The noise caused by the explosion drew Officer Ryan to the spot, and he arrested a man coming from the gate, whom he had locked up at the Central Station. The burglar, who gave the name of George Jeffries, will have a hearing to-day before Alderman Kerr.

—The ram Atlanta is given up as lost, at least by Surrogate Hutchings, of New York, that official having on Saturday granted letters of administration on the estate of Sidney Oaksmith, who sailed in her from Phila-

delphia. -In the United States Senate on Saturday, after the close of our report, the Indian Appropriation bill was considered, pending which the Senate adjourned.

In the House the opponents of General Schenck's tariff amendment to the Tax bill continued to filibuster until the hour of adjournment.

Foreign Affairs.

-Yellow fever was raging with great virulence at Rio at the date of last advices. -Large quantities of arms have, it is said, been recently despatched to the Cuban insurgents.

-The Englishmen recently captured by Spanish brigands have been released. -The expected ministerial crisis in France

has been averted by a vote in the Corps Legislatif on Saturday. -An English shipping journal calls for joint action by England and the United States

against the extortions practised upon vessels arriving in Cuban waters. -Montpensier's chance of gaining the Spanish crown is regarded as lost, the Cortez having resolved that no candidate shall be

elected unless he receive a majority equal to one half the full number of Deputies. -A cable despatch from London says:-"Despatches from the United States announce the receipt there of news of massacre of Jews by Christians in Roumania. No advices have reached here on the subject, and the Continental news agency deny that there has been any recent outrages upon the Jews of Roumania. A despatch from Bucharest states that a riot occurred last week at Botuscably, a village in Moldavia, during a local

election. It is described as an ordinary poli-

tical disturbance, being quelled without the interference of troops.

Destructive Fire. About 11 o'clock on Saturday night a fire was discovered in the third story of the building, Nos. 15 and 17 South Third street owned by J. G. Rosengarten & Son, occupied by J. B. Cornet, manufacturer of dress trimmings, etc., and before the flames were extinguished, the fourth and fifth stories were burned out, and several adjoining buildings damaged by fire and water. Cornet's loss on machinery, stock, etc., will reach, it is supposed, from \$15,000 to \$25,000. The law and collection office of Fairthorne & Rand occupying the first floor, was not reached by the fire. All the more valuable books and papers were wholly uninjured being in three large fire proofs, and the remainder received but slight damage, owing to the promptness with which they were protected by the Insurance patrol. No interruption to the business of the firm will be caused by the fire. William Allen's restaurant in the basement of No. 17 was also flooded. The loss is estimated at about \$600; no insurance. The second story, occupied by the Drug Exchange Association, was also damaged by water. The flames extended to the sixth story of building No. 13, owned and occupied by W. A. Drown & Co., who lose by water and fire from \$10,000 to \$15,000, which is fully covered by insurance. This firm also have a store at No. 246 Market street, and joins the Third street building at the rear, but iron doors between the two buildings prevented the spread of the flames in that direction.

Tener & Co.'s law and collection offices were in the first story of No. 13 South Third street. They lose from \$500 to \$600 by water, which is covered by insurance. Building No. 19, owned by Thomas and John L. Lawson, was also damaged by water. J. M. Chase, manufacturer of shoe uppers, occupied the upper stories, and Mr. W. Ledyard, banker, the first story, and both parties suffered considerable loss by the constant stream of water flowing into the building. Mr. Chase's loss is covered by insurance.

J. B. Cornet estimates his loss at \$25,000 on which there is an insurance in the Royal of \$9000, and in the Spring Garden Insurance office of \$5000. The building is owned by Dr. Rosengarten, who estimates his loss at
