NEWS SUMMARY.

City Affairs.

-The Park Commissioners held their annual meeting yesterday. The following officers of the Board were elected .-- President. Hon. Morton McMichael; Vice President, Maj.-Gen. George G. Meade, U. S. A.; Treasurer, N. B. Browne; Secretary, David F. Foley; Solicitor, Charles Henry Jones.

-The alarm of fire last night, about twelve o'clock, was caused by the burning of the ustillery at the northeast corner of Twentythird and South streets, lately occupied by Murphy & McGuigan. The upper part of the structure was destroyed. The fire is supposed to have been incendiary. The loss is not very heavy.

-At the session of the Grand Lodge, A P. A., the following grand officers were elected for the ensuing year: -James Alcorn, of No. 18, re-elected W. G. M.; Robert Wilson, of No. 38, W. G. V.; David C. Johnson, of No 83, W. G. S.; Samuel H. Brines, of No. 32, W. G. Chaplain; Robert Adams, of No. 37, W. G. Conductor: James L. Hollson, of No. 23, W. G. A. C.; Henry Arnold, of No. 72, W. G. Tyler.

The following were elected Representatives to the Right Worthy Grand Lodge of the United States :- Samuel Huchinson, of No. 68, and Edward S. Lyhter, of No. 83.

-The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Academy of Music was hold yesterday, Mr. John Eisenbrey, Jr., in the chair, and George P. Kimball, Esq., Secretary. The reports of the President and Treasurer show that \$12,000 was received for rent during the past year, and that two hundred and thirtysix entertainments were given in the building. A supplement to the charter authorizing the extinguishment of the amount of preferred stock was accepted. Stockholders were admitted to one hundred and nineteen entertainments, including seventy-one operas. There is only \$7600 of debt on the building, and there is cash enough on hand to pay this in full. The old board of directors was then re-elected, after which the meeting adjourned.

-The semi-monthly meeting of the Guardians of the Poor was held yesterday afternoon, in the office of the board, President John M. Whitall in the chair. The report of the House Agent exhibits the admittance to the institution within the past two weeks as 212; deaths, 42: eloped, 48; discharged, 228; births, 7; granted lodgings, 47; meals given away, 126. The number in the house at present is 3131, an increase of 94 over the corresponding time of last year. The number receiving out-door relief was 2760; of this number 860 were children. The report of the Steward shows receipts to the amount of \$1215.79. A report was read from the medical attendant, relating that it was detrimental to the health of the institution to receive cases of relapsing fever. The report was adopted after a short discussion, in which Mr. Parker complained that the doctor had not replied to certain questions embodied in a resolution passed at a previous meeting.

Section 4. That the Secretary of the Treasury is hereby authorized and instructed, with any coin in the Treasury of the United States, which in his opinion and discretion can be conveniently applied to that purpose, to pay at par and cancel any six per cent. bonds of the United States of the kind known as five-twenty bonds. which have become, or shall hereafter become redeemable by the terms of their issue. But the particular bonds so to be paid and cancelled shall, in all cases, be indicated and specified by class, date, and number in the order of their numbers and issue, beginning with the first number and issue, in public notice to be given by the Secretary of the Treasury, and in three months after the date of such public notice the interest on the bonds so selected and advertised to be paid shall cease. But it shall be competent for the holders and owners of any of said bonds, so specified for payment, to exchange the same for bonds issued under the authority of this act, at any time before the end of the notice pro-

vided for in the second section of this act. Section -... And be it further enacted, That the United States bonds purchased and now held in the Treasury in accordance with the provisions relating to a sinking fund of section five of an act entitled "An Act to authorize the issue of United States notes, and for the redemption or funding thereof, and for funding the floating debt of the United States," approved February 25, 1862, and all other United States bonds which have been purchased by the Secre-tary of the Treasury, with surplus funds in the Treasury, and now heid in the Treasury of the United States, shall be cancelled and destroyed. A detailed record of such bonds so cancelled and destroyed to be first made in the books of the Treasury Department. Any bonds hereafter applied to said sinking fund and all other United States bonds redeemed or paid here-after by the United States shall also in like manner be cancelled and destroyed, and the amount of the bonds of each class that have been cancelled and destroyed shall be deducted respectively from the amount of the class of the outstanding debt of the United States. In addition to other amounts that may be applied to the redemption or payment of the public debt, an amount equal to the interest on all bonds belonging to the aforesaid sinking fund shall be applied, as the Secretary of the Treasury shall from time to time direct, to the payment of the public debt, as provided for in section 5 of the

act aloresaid. Section (no number). And be it further en-acted, That the Secretary of the Treasury is hereby authorized to receive gold coin of the United States, or bullion, on deposit for not less than thirty days, in sums of not less than one hundred dollars, with the Treasurer or any Assistant Treasurer of the United States authorized to receive the same, who shall issue therefor certificates of deposit, made in such forms as the Secretary of the Treasury shall prescribe, and said certificates of deposit shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding three per centum per annum, and any amount of gold coin or bullion so deposited may be withdrawn from deposit at any time subsequent to thirty days from the date of deposit, after ten days' notice, and on the return of said certificates. Provided, that the interest on all such deposits shall cease and determine at the pleasure of the Secretary of the Treasury, and not less than twenty-five per centum of the coin and bullion deposited for or representing said certificates of deposit shall be retained in the Treasury for the payment of sald certificates, and the excess beyond twenty-five per centum may be applied, at the discretion of the Secretary of the Treasury, to the payment or redemption of such outstanding bonds of the United States heretofore issued and known as the fivetwenty bonds, as he may designate, under the provisions of the 4th section of this act, and any certificates of deposit issued as aforesaid, may be received at par with the interest accrued thereon, in payment for any bonds authorized to be issued by this act.

The New Funding Bill.

WASHINGTON, June 6 .- The following is the Funding Bill which was reported in the House to-day from the Committee on Ways and Means:-

Be it enacted, etc., That the Secretary of the Treasury is hereby authorized to issue, in a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate one thousand millions of dollars, coupon or registered bonds of the United States, in such form as he may prescribe, and of denominations of five hundred dollars or some multiple of that sum, redeemable in coin of the present standard value, at the pleasure of the United States after 30 years from the date of this issue, and bearing interest payable semi-annually in such coin at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum; which said bonds and the interest thereon shall be exempt from the payment of all taxes or duties of the United States, as well as from taxation in any form by or under State, municipal, or local authority, and the said bonds shall have set forth and expressed upon their face the above speci-fied conditions, and shall, with their cou pons, be made payable at the Treasury of the United States; but nothing in this act, or in any other law now in force, shall be construed to authorize any increase whatever of the bonded debt of the United States. Section 2. That the Secretary of the Treasury

is hereby anthorized to sell and dispose of any of the bonds issued under this act, at not less than their par value for coin, and to apply the proceeds thereof to the redemption of any of the bonds of the United States outstanding and known as 5-30 bonds, at their par value, or he may exchange the same for such 5-20 bonds or for par, but the bonds hereby authorized shall

for par, but the bonds hereby authorized shall be used for no other purpose whatsoever. Section 3. That the payment of any of the bonds hereby authorized, after the expiration of the said term of thirty years, shall be made in amounts to be determined from time to time by the Secretary of the Treasury, at his direction, and by classes to be distinguished and described by the dates and numbers, beginning for each uccessive payment with the bonds last dated and numbered, of the time of which intended payment or redemption the Secretary of the Treasury shall give public notice, and the in-terest on the particular bonds so selected at any
