

Benate. Senate. WASHINGTON, June 15.—Mr. Fenton presented a memo-rial in favor of the importation of pig lead free of duty; from New York dealers of hides and leather against the passage of the section in the new Tariff bill relating to cils, as tending to injure the manufacture of leather, and from Moses Tay or, Commodore Vanderbilt and others against any repeal of the Registry law by which foreign-built ships shall be admitted for any term of years to register in the United States.

It provides that there shall not be collected any duty whatever on coal imported into the United States atter the 31st of Decembor, 1870, nor shall there be required any internal revenue on any receipt, manifest, charter party, conveyance, lease or contract, or other instrument of which coal forms the exclusive or chief subject of consideration; nor shall any enumera-tion be made in taxing gross receipts from the transpor-tation or conveyance of coal; nor shall any special tax be imposed on any vehicle or vassel, by land or water, employed exclusively or dhiely in carrying coal; nor shall any tonnage duty be imposed upon or exacted from such vessels, nor shall sales of coal by auctioneers or otherwise be included in the es-timate of sales, nor shall the profits arising from the mining of coal or from dealing therein be included in computing incomes from taxation; nor shall any other tax be imposed on coal or traffic in it. The minority report, which is signed by Messrs. Hooper, Allison, Brooks, and Marshall, states that there were two members absent when the matter was considered; that the minority could not agree with the bill as reported by the majority, and therefore proposed a substitute, and stated that if all the members of the committee had been present, the minority bill would have been adopted.
